Science fair shows off projects

At a science fair on May 1, Hoxie elementary students showcased science projects made possible by a \$10,000 grant.

All of the elementary students participated in the experiments; a total of 200 students were involved. Work on the projects began in January and included topics such as soybeans, physical science, magnets, electricity, chemical reactions, plants, weather, minerals and motion.

High school students in the district assisted with experiments and helped to track their progress with newly purchased iPads. The photos, videos and project documentation added a new dimension to the fair and helped students to learn more about creative technology tools.

"This grant provided a tremendous boost to our math and science programs," said Scott Hoyt, district superintendent and elementary principal. "We were able to purchase iPads and a variety of materials for science experiments to incorporate technology into our curriculum. After a semester's worth of work, the students were able to display their efforts at the science fair for the whole community to see."

"Even when students are young, it is important to emphasize science and create an interest in careers in the science and technology fields," Hoyt said. "The kids really enjoyed the projects, and the whole community was impressed with the caliber of projects that the children were able to produce. It has been a really positive experience."

Why does it take God so long to act?


The people of Israel groaned because of their slavery and cried out for help. Their cry for rescue from slavery came up to God. And God heard their groaning ... remembered his covenant ... saw the people of Israel – and God knew (Exodus 2:23-25).

How much suffering do we have to undergo before we realize we can't depend on ourselves to turn things around? How many times do we have to trip over the boot straps we've been attempting to pull ourselves up by? Wearing a prideful attitude on our sleeves, we are bound to make matters worse until we finally – broken, helpless and weak – come to our senses.

Of course in our pain we might ask "Where is God?"

Where is God? He's been hanging around patiently watching, waiting and perhaps wincing at times. Yes, he cares about us and that may mean disciplining us, allowing us to experience hardships so that we finally let go of our bootstraps and grab on to him in faith. When we groan, God hears us. 
