Colby track athletes qualify for state

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The Colby High track and field team has 10 members going to the state track meet in Wichita on Friday and Saturday, seven girls and three boys who qualified at the Class 4A regional meet Friday at Hoyt-Royal Valley High School north of Topeka.

The girls took sixth place out of 15 teams and the boys 10th of 16. Both competed in 18 events. Hannah Strange, Andrea Browne, Brielle McKee, Kaitlyn Flanagin, Sydney Stephens, Karly Shull and Katie Elias qualified for the girls. On the boys team, Wiatt Binder, Andrew Taylor and Beau Brown won trips to state.

The top four placing athletes or teams in each event go on to state, said boys head coach Gordon Rasmussen.

Strange and Taylor will be the first Colby athletes to take the field Friday. Strange will compete in the high jump and Taylor will throw the javelin, both at 3 p.m. McKee will run at 3:35 in the 400 meters, and Binder will run in the same race for the boys at 3:55. Flanagin will run in the 300-meter hurdles at 4:20, and Flanagin, McKee, Stephens and Shull will run the 4x400-meter relay at 5:55 p.m, and Browne's event will start 7 p.m. Brown will be the last to compete, running the 100-meter dash at 9 a.m. Saturday.

McKee, Flanagin, Stephens and Shull qualified in the girls 4x400 relay by running the preliminaries in 4 minutes, 16.90 seconds, then taking third in the finals with 4:08.76. Elias will be going with them an alternate.

Strange took first place in the high jump with a leap of 5-02.00 5-02.00 in the preliminaries.

Browne took second in the 3,200 meter-run when she finished in 11:51.47 after running the preliminary race in 12:20.80. McKee came in second in the 400 meters with 1:00.93, running a 1:02.20 in the preliminaries. Flanagin was fourth in the 300-meter hurdles; she finished in 48:56, and ran a 48.40 in the preliminaries.
