New nursing scholarships available at university

The Dane G. Hansen Foundation has awarded the Department of Nursing at Fort Hays State University a \$50,000 grant to provide scholarship support for undergraduate nursing students enrolled in the registered nurse to Bachelor of Science in Nursing programs. "This scholarship will help stu-

dents afford a higher education from the Department of Nursing," said Dr. Christine Hober, chair of the department. "The expectations for the nursing profession have grown exponentially to include more complex patient care in all arenas of health care." A maximum of 25 students, en-

rolling full time or part time, will be eligible for this scholarship yearly. Applicants must live in a northwest Kansas county while attending Fort Hays State University, meet all admission criteria for the program and agree to work full time in a northwest Kansas community for at least two years

after graduation. Eligible counties include Logan, Rawlins, Sheridan, Sherman, Thomas and Wallace, among others. For information, contact the department at (785) 628-4255.
