Enjoy your picnic; keep your food safe

Picnic and barbecue season is a great opportunity for outdoor fun with family and friends. But it can also be an ideal opportunity for food borne bacteria to thrive.

Protect yourself, your family and friends from food-borne illness during warm-weather months by practicing safe food handling when transporting, preparing and serving food for your special outing.

- Keep cold food cold. Place cold food in a cooler with ice or frozen gel packs. Cold food should be stored at 40°F or below to prevent bacterial growth. Food may be packed while still frozen so it stays colder longer.

- Organize cooler contents. Consider packing beverages in one cooler and perishable foods in another. Then as the beverage cooler is being opened and reopened, the perishable foods won't be exposed to warm outdoor air temperatures.

- Keep coolers closed. Limit the number of times the cooler is opened as much as you can to keep the contents cold longer.

- Don't cross-contaminate. Keep raw meat, poultry, and seafood securely wrapped. This keeps their juices from contaminating prepared and cooked foods or foods which will be eaten raw, such as fruits and vegetables. Using the same platter or utensils which previously held raw meat, poultry, or seafood allows bacteria from the raw food's juices to spread to the cooked food. Use a clean platter and utensils to serve cooked food.

- Clean your produce. Wash fresh fruits and vegetables before packing them in the cooler. Packaged fruits and vegetables labeled "ready-to-eat," "washed," or "triple washed" don't need to be washed again.

- It's important to follow safe grilling guidelines to make sure

your grilled food reaches the table safely.

- Marinate foods only in the refrigerator. Don't reuse marinade. If you plan to use some of the marinade as a sauce on the cooked food, reserve a portion separately before adding the raw meat.

- If you partially cook food to reduce grilling time, do so immediately before the food goes on the hot grill.

- Always use your food thermometer to be sure food is cooked thoroughly. The color of the food or juices is not an accurate indication of doneness. The Department of Agriculture recommended temperatures are:

- Ground beef, pork, veal, lamb — 160 degrees.

- Steaks, chops, roasts — 145 degrees, and rest 3 minutes

- Chicken or turkey breasts, whole pieces or ground — 165 degrees.

- Fish and shellfish, any type — 145 degrees.

- Ham, fresh or smoked (uncooked) — 145 degrees, let rest 3 minutes.

- Keep food hot until served by moving it to the side of the grill rack, just away from the coals or flame. It will stay hot but not get overcooked.

- Don't cross-contaminate. Worth repeating. Read above. Basically if it has touched raw meat, don't let it touch cooked or prepared food or food that is eaten raw.

Marvin E. McKinney

Marvin E. McKinney, 90, a retired farmer from Menlo, died Monday, June 10, 2013, at the Sheridan County Health Complex in Hoxie.

He was born Oct. 13, 1922, in Menlo, the son of Francis and Sophie McKinney. He attended school in Menlo until third grade, when his family moved north of Colby. In 1940 he graduated from Colby High School, where he participated in the all-state scholarship contest and was a member of the Honorary Scholarship Organization and 4-H.

Following graduation he enlisted in the Army Air Corps and studied airplane mechanics. Home on leave in December 1941, he was order to return at once following the bombing of Pearl Harbor. That January, he received the third highest score on his exam for pilot training, which he completed and was commissioned as a second lieutenant. He served in Italy, where he flew 60 bombing missions.

Following the war he earned a

degree in physics from the University of Kansas. He lived in Wichita and Lawrence, Fort Collins, Colo., and Westcliffe, Colo. He worked as a mail carrier and had a shop in Westcliffe.

In 1980, he moved back to Menlo, where he enjoyed gardening and canning, painting, drawing and woodworking, and making gifts for friends and family.

Survivors include a brother-in-law, Edgar Brown; a sister, Delores Brenenstall; and nieces and nephews.

Graveside services will be at 2 p.m. Thursday, June 13, 2013, at the Menlo Cemetery, with Pastor Cyd Stein officiating and military honors.

Visitation will be from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. Thursday at the Kersenbrock Funeral Chapel in Colby.
