He's had a chance to meet Nelson Mandela and the late, great Mother Theresa. He's chatted with numerous NBA legends from Charles Barkley to Chris Webber to Gary Payton.

Yet the Milwaukee native also enjoys seeing true friends like Colby Recreation Director Stacy (Lee) Jasper, retired postmaster Kent Kriebhiel and Colby Con-Saddler.

In other words, all those world travels have only made "Tree" more grounded. Though his Colby College days are now more than 25 years ago, Gordon always makes sure the Kansas town is included on his Global Legends Basketball Camp tour.

'As long as Colby wants me, I'll be back," he said. "I'll never forget how people invited me over to dinner, helped me get used to the small town. It was a different scene coming from the inner city ... but there's a lot of love out here."
