Revenues, expenditures rise

Per capita revenues (adjusted Leatherman, director of the Office gram. for inflation) in Thomas County increased 3 percent between 2003 and 2011 to \$838, a new report from Kansas State University shows, while the county's per capita expenditures increased 1 percent to \$828 per person.

Meanwhile, real per capita revenues in the average Kansas county increased 26 percent to \$1,417 and expenditures rose 32 percent to \$1,471.

This data comes from researchers at Kansas State who have iust released the newest "Kansas County Fiscal Conditions and Trends" report to county commissions statewide. The 14th in a series, the report's

customized analyses detail each county's tax and spending trends from 2003 to 2011. The data come from the counties' own budget documents, submitted to the Kansas Department of Administration every year.

"It all starts with having access to basic data," Leatherman said. "We're simply trying to give county commissioners tools that can help them monitor their financial situation.

"At the same time, though, the report can provide average citizens with unbiased, independent information about local government finance. So, it can serve as a starting point for dialogue between elected officials and their constituents.'

"You need to look beyond the numbers to understand the local situation," she said. "You also need to consider any part of the broader context that may be affecting local finances, such as the current economic environment or trends in state aid programs."

This augmented approach is particularly important when counties are examining major capital expenditures, she said. For example, infrequent but often costly investments might include a new jail, major road project or courthouse renovation.
