Amazing Bible stands scrutiny through history of varied criticism

The Bible is an amazing book! No other book has been attacked throughout history as the Bible. Yet, all the criticisms are like tiny hammers that wear out as they bang against the mighty "anvil" of God's inspired word.

For example, some people say that the Bible has been corrupted over the centuries – that mistakes have crept in. The answer to that misconception is that Jewish scribes and ancient monks have carefully preserved both Old and New Testaments by meticulously copying them over the centuries.

Some manuscripts of the New Testament such as the Magdalene Fragments date as early as A.D. 65 – while the apostles were still alive and writing. Jesus quoted a Greek translation of the Old Testament that dated around 200 B.C., and never indicated that he had any doubt about its accuracy.

The fact is that when scholars compare the more than 25,000 available manuscripts of the Bible, they find less than one half of one percent discrepancies in them – and most of those involve spelling errors. The fact is that the Bibles we have available to us are translations of God's inspired word that he has preserved intact

Some critics have scoffed at the Bible, saying that it is a book of myths – that its stories are not historically correct.

They pointed out that the city of Nineveh mentioned in Jonah never existed, though Jonah said it was so large that it would take three days to walk around it. Then one day the city of Nineveh was found by archaeologists. It is so enormous that it will probably never be fully excavated. It would indeed take three days to walk around the city.

 Don't assume the farmer knows you're there. Most operators regularly check for vehicles behind them, however, most of their time must be spent watching for oncoming traffic. Implements are loud, hindering the farmer's ability to hear your vehicle.

 Pass with extreme caution. Don't pass unless you can see clearly ahead of both your vehicle and the farm equipment you are passing. If there are curves or hills blocking your view of oncoming traffic, wait. You should not pass in a designated "No Passing Zone," even if you are stuck behind a farm vehicle. Do not pass within 100 feet of any intersection, railroad grade crossing, bridge, elevated structure, or tunnel.
