Colby Sharks earned some vacation time around the pool after earning 12 trophies and two league championships during last weekend's swim club season fi-

others excelled at the league meet. Catlin was simply awesome as she won two events, earned one second and took third another three times in addition to swim-


ming for two 11-12 girls cham-
