Library gets new books for kids

Lately, I have had some really cool and fun junior nonfiction items come across the circulation desk while I was checking things out or in. They have inspired me to tell you about the new things we have added and also those we have had for a time.

The first is "Unbored: The Essential Field Guide to Serious Fun," by Joshua Glenn and Elizabeth Foy Larsen. It is divided into four sections: You, Home, Society and Adventure.

The You section has guides to goofing off, do it yourself, mind and body discussions, telling your story and instrument making to rock out. Home gives kids ideas for their room, crafts, outdoors, cooking pets and more. Society has social events, school information, saving the planet ideas, media and the ways people can and did get around.

The Adventure chapter provides experiments, games, outdoor activities, exploration and ways to expand your horizons. Just by opening the book, I found fun information on condiments. It told us about mayonnaise, ketchup, mustard, relish, sour cream and chili.

In another section it gives instructions on making a stop-action movie. It provides lists of things needed, how to shoot and edit the material.

some sketches as enhancement. One creative way to have children have the fun of throwing eggs is to enlist them to blow the egg yolk and white out of the shell and then place seeds in the eggs shells. Then if you wanted to plant native seeds in a highway area or natural park area, the children take the eggs and throw them into the field (Make Seed Grenades, pp. 279-280).

Wouldn't that be an experience?

The second item is "How To Draw Graffiti Style," by Kevin "Astek" Fitzpatrick, is not about graffiti but the art work and style that has come out of true talented graffiti artists.

This book outlines the drawing out of the art with pen or fine pencil, then preparing it for a canvas or paper.

Not just anyone is going to be able to make the 3D effects and images this book portrays. But if a person has an artistic flare they could pick up ways to grow in their talent. The book has basic techniques, lettering, characters, stenciling, color and taking graf-

fiti into the digital format.

The next two are for those teens that are given to writing or creating stories. The first item is entitled, "Spilling Ink," A Young Writers Handbook," by Ann Mazer and Ellen Potter. This is a great book with 31 sections, each a quick read with simple, clear instructions. An adult writer would learn faster about writing when reading this book than one written for adults. It is written in such a way that the person even skimming may come away with information, ideas and tricks.

The next book on writing is "Seize the Story: A Handbook for Teens Who Like to Write," by Victoria Hanley. It has discussions from authors who specialize in youth material.

This one is a bit more refined in writing and discussion. I'd read "Spilling Ink" first then transition to "Seize the Story," which picks up on more details in various topics. "Seize the Story" is for a more mature teen reader.

The next item we added was for the teen who wants to make films. It is "Filmmaking For Teens," by Troy Lanier and Clay Nichols. This will help students take their film idea and truly produce something of importance. It talks about the screenplay, producers, time, money, director's work, the eye of the person observing the monitor, all the various equipment, light-

ing, sound, editing, publication and distribution.

This book is detailed enough for students in a class to read through follow and produce either in high school or college. It has all the basics in easy to follow instructions. Adults could use it as a primer as well.

Other fun nonfiction junior items we have are: "Quotations For Kids," compiled and edited by J.A. Senn. Another item is "This Book Made Me Do It: Cool Things to Make, Do, and Explore" by John Woodward. We have added two volumes of the series, "Encyclopedia of Immaturity," by Klutz editors. We also have many DK books that cover the space, animals, other sciences, inventions, nations, and more. Boys will especially enjoy these items.

Remember to come to the library when it is hot. Enjoy our cool environment to read the newspaper, magazine, book, or tablet. Put some earphones in and listen to an audio book. Bring in your laptop or tablet and do some business or e-mailing.
