Library gets new books for kids

Lately, I have had some really cool and fun junior nonfiction items come across the circulation desk while I was checking things out or in. They have inspired me to tell you about the new things we have added and also those we have had for a time.

The first is "Unbored: The Essential Field Guide to Serious Fun," by Joshua Glenn and Elizabeth Foy Larsen. It is divided into four sections: You, Home, Society and Adventure.

The You section has guides to goofing off, do it yourself, mind and body discussions, telling your story and instrument making to rock out. Home gives kids ideas for their room, crafts, outdoors, cooking pets and more. Society has social events, school information, saving the planet ideas, media and the ways people can and did get around.

The Adventure chapter provides experiments, games, outdoor activities, exploration and ways to expand your horizons. Just by opening the book, I found fun information on condiments. It told us about mayonnaise, ketchup, mustard, relish, sour cream and chili.

In another section it gives instructions on making a stop-action movie. It provides lists of things needed, how to shoot and edit the material.

Another item is "This Book Made Me Do It: Cool Things to Make, Do, and Explore" by John Woodward. We have added two volumes of the series, "Encyclopedia of Immaturity," by Klutz editors. We also have many DK books that cover the space, animals, other sciences, inventions, nations, and more. Boys will especially enjoy these items




