the schools saw last year (the year before, enrollment dropped 2.1 percent). The district expected an extra \$241,000 out of the increase, but only got \$87,000 because of a reduction in state special education funding. The board approved an amended budget in May to reflect the extra money it had.

In other business, the board:

- Approved its year-end transfers from last year. They included \$374,220 in the district general fund, \$200,768 in the supplemental general fund, \$66,000 in vocational education, \$16,489 in bilingual education, \$140,000 in the at-risk fund, \$90,000 in special education, \$70,768 in professional development, \$40,000 in food service and \$151,731 in the capital outlay fund.
- DeYoung reported that the district has a total of \$3,199,861 in unencumbered cash balances.
- Set its monthly meetings for the coming year for the third Monday of the month in the administration building by Colby Grade School. The meetings will be at 7 p.m., except for next month's meeting.
- Approved a resolution to rescind all policy changes from the previous year.
- Approved a resolution against discrimination

in administering any district program.

- · Waived cash basis and budget law requirements, determining that there are no revenue bond or other ordinances which require financial state-
- Authorized itself to pay any claims in advance where there is a discount for early payment.
- Established petty cash funds of \$300 for the grade school, \$300 for the middle school, \$1,500 for the high school, \$200 for food service and \$200 for administration, to be used in an emergency. It also set up activity funds for the grade school, middle school and high school to hold money for sports and other activities.
- Voted to appoint John Gatz as the school district attorney again this year, at the rate of \$165
- Approved a resolution to destroy records from before July 1, 2006. This includes all purchase order requisitions, purchases orders and vouchers, canceled checks and receipts for all funds except capital outlay, and all purchase order requisitions, purchase orders, vouchers, receipts, canceled checks and bank statements for the activity funds for the grade school, middle school and high
