First West Nile case reported for 2013

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment has reported the first case of West Nile doors to keep mosquitoes out. virus for 2013.

The individual that tested posi- sites by emptying standing wative is an adult from Atchison ter from flower pots, buckets and County. The department has also learned of the first West Nile virus positive mosquito sample in Kansas for 2013, collected from Sedgwick County.

West Nile virus can be spread to people through bites from infected mosquitoes, but it is not contagious from person to person. common in the late summer and Symptoms range from a slight headache and low-grade fever to swelling of the brain or brain tissue and in rare cases, death. People who have had West Nile virus 2002. before are considered immune.

The department recommends the following precautions to protect against West Nile virus:

• When you are outdoors, use insect repellent containing DEET, picaridin, oil of lemon eucalyptus, on the package.

• Many mosquitoes are most active at dusk and dawn. Be sure to use insect repellent and wear long sleeves and pants at these times or consider staying indoors during these hours.

 Make sure you have good screens on your windows and Get rid of mosquito breeding

barrels. Change the water in pet dishes and replace the water in bird baths weekly. Drill holes in tire swings so water drains out. Keep children's wading pools empty and on their sides when they aren't being used.
