

Be thankful for a place like Colby, where politically correct "let's play nice" ideas and college football conference changes still can't touch one good rivalry.

"Pick Kansas' football record this fall? I hate KU! If I'd known they were on here, I wouldn't have even touched this piece of paper!"

Okay, that was the most extreme reaction during a friendly Tuesday survey. Some fans even suggested that Thanksgiving weekend will be a time to celebrate many Kansans' other favorite fowl.

"That last game could be real close. I could see the Jayhawks beating K-State," another Colby football fan said about the new holiday tradition of Kansas and Kansas State colliding. "I say K-State will go 6-6 this season and that's a pretty 'iffy' 6-6."

Wow, that's a long drop from Kansas State's 11-2 Big 12 championship season in 2012. Though 6-6 is still far better than Kansas' 1-11 mark last fall, many Colby residents surveyed do see the gap getting closer.

"I say 9-3 for Kansas this year," one said.

Even neutral observers coughed a bit on this one.

"Really, (coach) Charlie Weis usually does great things in his second year," this observer added while the surveyor noted several red-and-blue items nearby. "They've brought in some good
