Getting ready to go back to school can be a hectic time for both kids and parents. Schools in the area are all starting soon. Colby Public Schools start in just eight short days!

Here are some simple steps to take to make the transition from summer to school a little easier. If you haven't already, it's time to start winding down the summer schedule and start back with regular bed and breakfast times. More and more studies are

showing that adequate sleep is es-

sential for good health.

How much sleep do kids need? It depends on their age. Three- to 6-year-olds need 10 to 12 hours of sleep per day. Typically this age group goes to bed between 7 and 9 p.m. and wake up around 6 to

Seven- to 12-year-olds need 10 to 11 hours per day. At these ages, with social, school, and family activities, bedtimes gradually become later and later, with most 12-year-olds going to bed at about

There is still a wide range of bedtimes, from 7:30 to 10 p.m., as well as total sleep times, from 9 to 12 hours, although the average is only about nine hours. Twelve to 18-year-olds need a

minimum of eight to nine hours per day. Sleep needs remain just as vital to health and well-being for teenagers as when they were younger.

In fact, many teenagers may need more sleep than in previous years. However, social pressures generally work against this.

Remember that breakfast is considered the most important meal of the day. Research has shown that children who have eaten breakfast are more attentive in class and score higher on tests and
