To make a garni, gather thyme, bay leaves, parsley or other herbs. Wrap them in cheesecloth and tie at the top so the leaves and stems stay soup, stew or stock for added flavor, removing

the opposing diamonds were divided 3-2, declar-
er would make an overtrick, eventually discarding his clubloser on a good diamond. At the very least, declarer would lose only a club after ruffing a spade in dummy.
So without giving the matter further thought,
South won the diamond jack with the ace and South won the diamond jack with the ace and
cashed the A-K of trumps. Upon finding the trumps divided 3-1, he stopped playing the suit
and instead played the ace of spades and ruffed a spade with dummy's last trump. When declarer next tried to enter his hand by leading a diamond ace for down one.
