"What we didn't think of was exactly what came up this morning – people being concerned about their safety," Steele said.

In particular, Steele cited concerns about the safety of female officers working alone and locating isolated offices in the basement of the proposed build-

"We employ female officers," Steele said. "We need to be sure we have males around (for secu-

Former commissioner John meeting, asked the commissioners if they were planning to build a combination jail and court sys-

tem to increase security.

Steele said that is his plan, but Beck's expertise will help the county determine the feasibility of the current designs.

"There is an awful lot of the community that does not want this courthouse abandoned," said Bremenkamp. "I see no other use for it than a county office building.... If you took the court out of here, you would have plenty of room for your county offices."

nauseum the secondary and tertiary issues around the problem," he said. For instance, relatives of the Newton, Conn.,

shooting victims last year wanted to ban assault weapons after 20 students and six staff were killed by a mentally disturbed man with an assault weapon Dec. 14. Feldman said he went on several talk shows with the relatives and eventually asked them if they would feel better if their loved ones had been killed with a different

kind of gun. He pointed out that Adam Lanza, the shooter in Newton, killed his mother after he got into a gun safe that focus on whose was not locked. He also heard talk of limiting

the size of the magazines used **guns."** with some guns. That might slow a shooter down, he said, but it could do the same thing to someone defending their

"We focus on the gun, but we never focus on whose hands are on the guns," he said.

As for solutions, Feldman pointed to the deranged shooters who kill large numbers of people and said after his lecture that he thinks the mental health system in this country is a mess. He said Jared Lee Loughner, who killed six people in Arizona in 2011, was kicked out of a community college, but not sent to an institution.

His requests to several politicians to set up gunsafety classes were also ignored, Feldman said. Rural communities such as his in New Hampshire could set those classes up on their own, while urban ones would wait for a federal program to help. If there's one thing rural America can teach the urban side, Feldman said, it's not to wait to leaders themselves to lead.

Feldman said he cannot stand politicians saying they have a "simple common-sense solution" to a

"Let's admit it," he said, "life's complicated, all the issues are complicated."

The Supreme Court has backed the idea that the Second Amendment means people have a right to own a gun in their house for self defense, he said. It would be impossible to disarm 100 million people in this country with firearms.

Some people think guns should be regulated after seeing them used in violent crimes, he said. But gun owners see the government trying to regulate the guns they have never misused, and

Urban Democrats have the strongest feelings against guns, Feldman said. He added that as many kids were killed in Chicago within a week of the Newton shootings as had died in the shootings themselves, in crime-related shootings. Feldman said he lives in the small college town

of Rindge, N.H., and owns 160 guns. "If I owned 1,000 guns the crime rate in my

town wouldn't go up one iota," he said, but he could cause a spike in violent crime within a day if the took the short trip to Boston and sold his When talking to police in

some big cities, Feldman said he learned that between 35 and 60 percent of violent gun crime is connected to illegal drugs. He said drug cartels have control in both Mexico and big cities like Chicago. "There's something we could

do and Congress could do to reduce gun-related violence by 30 percent," he said. "Shouldn't

we be doing it?"

After the lecture, Feldman said he has spoken to a group called Law Enforcement Officers Against Prohibition. He added that the founder of the group, Jack Cole, once told him that the more dangerous the drug, the more important it is to legalize and regulate it. He said much of the money that goes into the war on drugs could be used for other things, like mental health. American society is broke, Feldman said, and "being broke does force you to grow up sometimes.'

In this case, he said, growing up involves choosing which issues to tackle with limited

As a lobbyist, Feldman said, he could often get money and membership for an organization with a political fight. But the key to solving problems is finding common ground where most people agree on an issue and not bickering with those

Jan Barnum asked Feldman for his solution on gun control during a question and answer session after the lecture. She and her husband Scott did not agree with his take on not banning assault weapons

"When you have a big issue that comes up like Newton, Conn., you've got to do something," Scott Barnum said.

But they both appreciated Feldman's look at who uses guns, and not the guns themselves.

"I hadn't thought of it in terms of the demand for guns related to black market drugs," he said.
