After each of the first seven miracles – they were plagues to the Egyptians and each plague, ironically, involved an Egyptian god – Pharaoh hardened his heart.

He refused to believe in the true God; he refused to believe that Yahweh was the Lord and was on top of his gods. From then on God hardened his heart. It was all a part of the grand plan. Pharaoh's hard-heartedness would prove to the world that Yahweh was truly in charge, that he was the one true God.

It's sad, but we all know someone who is hard-hearted when it comes to believing in the Savior. It's especially sad for us when they're related to us.

It saddens God that anyone will go to hell (whether they believe in it or not). He wants all people to be saved and come to know the truth. At some point does God do the hardening? If it serves his grand plan I suppose he could, but generally speaking God is patient, so there's always hope.

God raised Moses – remember, he could have been among the many Israelite baby boys that died as a result of the Pharaoh's decree – as part of a grand plan to free and save his people.
