# Big-play Bluejays erase 22-10 Colby lead

Don't worry, Colby High's first lead all football season will not be its last if the Eagles keep playing like Friday night against visiting

The crazy-fun roller-coaster ride leading to an eventual 37-22 Norton victory clearly left everyone wearing Colby colors a little

Yet it also showed with more experience and better halftime adjustments, the Eagles could soon be capturing that elusive first win.

"They (Norton) blitzed a little more than they had before, and that hurt us in the second half," coach Chris Gardner said about Colby letting a 22-10 halftime advantage slip away. "So did theirquarterback draw (plays). I just have to get them better prepared on how to handle a lead.

Norton sophomore quarterback Jordan Dole will be a tough load to handle for many opponents during these next two-plus seasons.

The 200-pounder showed both power and speed as his 68-yard touchdown run ignited that Bluejay comeback.

Norton (4-2 record) delivered three more scores in the final quarter. A pair came on fourth-down plays, including senior halfback Tanner Furbush's 21-yard gametying journey to pigskin paradise.

The ensuing extra-point kick made it 23-22 and sent Norton to its fourth consecutive victory. Another pair of TDs in the final minutes sealed this win.

Meanwhile, Colby (0-6) remained winless despite a powerful first-half effort.

Everyone will remember the remarkable 16-point flurry that took less than 59 seconds before halftime. It matched Colby's highest scoring effort in five previous entire games this fall.

Yet it was an absolutely beastly performance from linebackers Bryce Arnberger, Eric Schuette, Garrett Rose and senior leader Andrew Taylor which really set the strong Colby tone.

Together, they would eventually make 32 sacks with several huge stops holding Norton a first-quarter field goal.

Even when Furbush's first touchdown of the game created a 10-0 advantage, Colby defense kept this contest within striking
