Four-vehicle pileup leaves nine uninjured

Nine out of 10 people escaped injury in a four-vehicle pileup early Wednesday morning on Interstate 70 by the Levant interchange.

The pileup happened when other vehicles swerved to avoid a GMC Suburban stopped on the side of the road, according to the Kansas Highway Patrol, which worked the accident. Only one of the 10 out-of-state travelers involved in the pileup went to the hospital.

At 12:48 Wednesday morning, a tractor-trailer rig almost hit the trailer being towed by the sport utility vehicle stopped at the right side of the road. Raymond Jackson McInvale, 78, of Vian, Okla., had been headed

west on Interstate 70 in a 1995 Suburban when he stopped just east of mile marker 45. Donald Lafa Wayne, 48, Springfield, Mo., had to turn to avoid the Suburban, and turned the 2008 Peterbilt semi-rig he was in into the median.

Wayne and McInvale were both wearing seat belts, and both were unhurt.

Another sport utility vehicle, apparently carrying a family, also turned to avoid the Suburban and collided with a truck in the left lane of the highway. Sara Launa Lewis, 49, of Oklahoma City, swerved left in a 2002 Chevrolet Avalanche, and clipped the back of a 2012 Ford truck from Illinois.

Sara Lewis was unhurt, as were Phila

Rose Lewis, 25, Emily Louise Lewis, 20, and Alexandria L. Lewis, a 2 1/2 week-old baby. Alan Lewis, 52, the only one in the Avalanche not wearing a seatbelt, was taken to Citizen's Medical Center with what the patrol report called a "possible injury." He was then transferred to another facility. The passengers are all from Oklahoma City.

Edward D. Miller, 70, of Pinckneyville, Ill. was driving the Ford. After his truck was clipped, he hit the back of McInvale's Suburban. He and his passengers, Donald A. Nehring, 59, and Gary G. Grizzell, both of Pinckneyville, were unhurt. All were wearing seat belts.
