# Titans pounce on Jackrabbits for 48-0 win

It was the last home game for Triplains-Brewster senior Seth Smith, played on a clear, cool October Friday night in Winona against the visiting Greeley County Jackrabbits.

Smith will remember this game with pride, as he and his teammates held the 'Rabbits scoreless, ending the game in the third quarter with a crushing 48-0 victory.

Triplains-Brewster (4-3 record) opened the game by receiving the kickoff, and with only 60 seconds ticked off the clock, scored on a run by quarterback Ryan Gfeller to give the Titans a 6-0 start.

The 'Rabbits fumbled on their first play from scrimmage, and Gfeller again crossed the goal line for a Titan touchdown.

With the home team in complete control, Titans' running back Nathan Jorgensen charged to the third touchdown of this evening.

The Titans were unable to convert on the extra point attempt, but led 18-0.

Tony Aguilar stepped up on defense and broke thru the visitors'

back in the backfield. Sacking the quarterback again were Smith, Skyler Hansen, and Rook Shaw.

The 'Rabbits (2-5 record) started moving the ball down the field, but the defense of the Titans held and Greeley County was forced to turn the ball over after an unsuccessful fourth-down attempt.

Rogge caught a pass from Gfeller on the one-yard line for first and goal, and on the next play, Jace Jorgensen ran up the middle for a Titan touchdown.

Justin Schmidt caught a pass from Gfeller to successfully convert two points, giving the Titans a 26-0 lead with 1:26 left in the first half.

The second half began with Greeley County in control of the ball, but Taylor Stramel tipped a pitchout by the quarterback, caught the ball, and ran into the end zone for another six points.

Gfeller converted on the extra point attempt, and the Titans' lead increased to 34-0.

The Titans racked up 279 total offensive yards, while holding the Jackrabbits to just 90 yards.
