School board gives assignments

meet the team put on at Atwood and Andrea Barton took fourth.

The boys took sixth place and the girls team third at the league cross country meet in Scott City. The volleyball team came in fourth at the substate tournament Saturday. Because the state Class 4A volleyball teams have been divided into two subgroups, Gabel said, the team only played three games, against Goodland, Scott City and Hugoton. Finally, Gabel reported, the football schedule is ready for next year.

Curriculum Director Diana Wieland said the number of students enrolled in the after-school program at the grade school exceeds what administrators expected for even the next five years, so the school has moved money among line items of its budget to set aside more money for aides and teachers.

The school is applying for a \$3,000 grant from the Thomas County Community Foundation to buy more snacks. It will take about that much, Wieland said later, just to feed the kids who are in the program now.

Grade-school staff members were trained on Lexia Care, she said, a reading program for students of all abilities which is a part of the state reading initiative. A coordinating council meeting was set for Wednesday, Wieland said. She passed out a flyer about the career and technical education classes at local community colleges that the high

school plans to offer to its students.

Superintendent Terrell Harrison said students will join in the Veteran's Day Parade on Nov. 11. The district's wellness plan has been updated, she said, and is on the website. The plan details the time allotted for each meal, including breakfast, lunch and after-school snacks; requires limits on ingredients like sugars and fats; and details kinds and amounts of food that need to be included with each meal. It says that meals must comply with U.S. Department of Agriculture and state regulations.

The third-graders will perform a concert in the Grade School auditorium, Harrison said, and the district has completed a pre-evaluation of its administrators.

In other business, the board:

- Appointed Lemman to represent the board on the calendar committee, which works with the Colby unit of the Kansas National Education Association to set a schedule for teachers. The committee also includes teachers and administrators, Harrison said. It will meet before Nov. 15 and usually completes the calendar by February.

- Approved changes to its policy regarding leave and absences for classified, or support, staff discussed at the last meeting. Harrison said the specifics of the policy on sick days were removed, since the exact number is already in the employee handbook.

- Discussed insurance policies for employees. Business Manager Jo DeYoung

said that the Affordable Care Act, or Obamacare, will not directly affect the district's insurance.

Later, she said the district funds its own insurance pool and pays its own claims. She expects the cost to go up 10 to 15 percent. Blue Cross Blue Shield processes claims, negotiates contracts with providers and pays anything over \$50,000, DeYoung said. The company expects to charge 10 percent more for its services, she added, and predicts more people will file claims.

Also, the act has removed the lifetime maximum that a person can be covered for, and requires that dependents up to age 26 can stay on their parents' insurance.

- Approved resignations from Teresa Morgan, an after-school teacher; Lisa Heibult, a middle school aide; and Suzi Duncan, secretary for the activities director.

- Hired for Susan Hawkins as a food-service worker, Norman Kinderknecht as a part-time custodian, Ray Nolan as a part-time assistant athletic director, Denita Rodgers as a part-time assistant high school secretary and Ryan Becker, Paige Pfeifer and Kayla Weilert as middle school aides.

- OK'd supplemental contracts for Emily Chessmore as the head seventh-grade girls basketball coach, Sara Oesterrich as the assistant middle school basketball coach, Brad Bennett as the head eighth-grade girls basketball coach and Todd Kane as the assistant girls and boys basketball coach.

Dr. Larry and Joyce Washburn graduated from Colby Community College in 1967 and 1968, respectively. Both were selected as members of the Phi Theta Kappa, the honor society for community colleges.

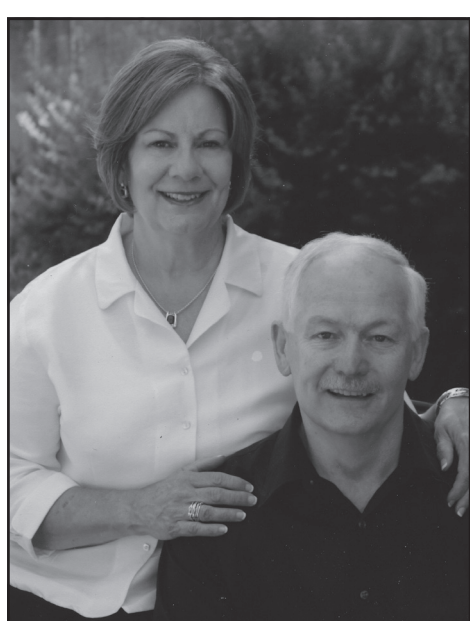
While attending the college, Larry ran track under Coach Ford Farber. Both Larry and Joyce graduated from Fort Hays State University in 1972. Larry earned a Bachelor of Science degree; Joyce a Bachelor of Science in elementary education.

Joyce continued her studies at Emporia State University, earning a master's degree in curriculum with a certificate in reading in 1976. Larry earned a doctorate from Southern College of Optometry in Memphis, Tenn., in 1977.

Joyce began working at the college part-time in 1980 and took a full-time position in 1986. She has been instrumental in many accomplishments at the college.

"I've been director of the Comprehensive Learning Center, adult education director, developmental reading instructor, division chair and recently retired as dean of academic affairs," she noted.

Joyce has been recognized for her commitment to student learning. In 1990, she was elected president of the Kansas Adult Education Association and also the College

Endowment Board. She received the Missouri Valley Adult Education Achievement Award in 1991 and has served on the Dr. Max Pickerill Lecture Series committee.

Because of her calm demeanor, ability to build consensus, her extensive experience in higher education and her work ethic, Joyce was selected as co-chair of the Higher Learning Commission Self Study in 2004. The efforts were rewarded with a 10-year re-accreditation for the college.

Joyce is teaching part-time for the college and is a member of the Colby Rotary Club and the Foundation for Hope. She is a past member of the Colby Diplomats.

Dr. Washburn is a Colby native with a successful optometry practice in Colby and Atwood. In addition to a demanding job, he has served as president of

the Thomas County Fair Board, the Friends of the Library, the Pioneer Memorial Library board, the Colby Chamber of Commerce, the Colby chapter of Ducks Unlimited and the Thomas County Alcohol and Drug Abuse Council board.

He is a vocal supporter of Colby Community College and the experience he had while attending the college and appeared in several television and print commercials promoting the college. Larry is a former member of Kiwanis, Ambassadors and Pheasants Forever.

The family tradition continued with the Washburn's two children. Daughter Taylor is an infectious disease doctor and faculty member at the University of Colorado Hospital in Denver. Son Drew works at VIP Research in Kansas City. While attending the college, both received the Phi Theta Kappa All-Kansas Academic Award. Taylor won the Mosier Award as outstanding sophomore. Drew, active in athletics, earned Academic All-American honors in track.

Larry is the son of Druscilla Washburn, a long-time and well-known resident of Colby.

"We are certainly CCC Proud," said Joyce. "This is an unexpected honor. Both Larry and I have great memories of our time at CCC. I have the distinction of saying I've worked for all five presidents at the college. I was a work-study while attending school when Dr. Mosier was president, and I worked as an instructor for Dr. Tangeman, Dr. Ary, Dr. Kreider and Dr. Vacik.

"The college has been a large part of our lives here in Colby. We look forward to continuing our involvement in the coming years."
