Expenditures for the year by the end of September are slightly under projection, Overstreet said, because the college has been clamping down on paying purchase orders. The college was expecting financial aid money to come in in September, but it didn't come in until this month. They have a lot of new people in the finance department who had not worked with financial aid before, Overstreet said. Financial aid work was done earlier in the month, but a glitch in the government's computer system has delayed some of the college's final financial aid disbursements, which have still not been made yet.

The college and its auditor are delaying audit work until November, so to college can finish several of its financial projects.

She also gave an update of the billing of overdue accounts owed to the college. Out of \$2 million the college expects to collect, she said, some of those gift would probably be used to

who owe money have been help cover the operating budget, contacted, and the college had received \$25,000 by the start of this month. They expect another \$80,000 soon from students. The college estimated it will have trouble collecting \$50,000, because it has bad addresses for some people who owe money, she said. Overstreet said the school is projected to be between \$300,000 and \$350,000 short on money to pay for its operating budget for November and December.
