

Everything except stop Taylor when it counted most. Like the approaching "fall back" time change, this Newark, N.J., product decided it was time to turn out lights early.


Taylor powered inside for a putback that put Colby ahead 68-62, and the Trojans finally finished off Sunrise, 72-65, Saturday evening.
