(corn) crop," said Hi-Plains Co-Op Manager John Strecker. "Milo's less than average, but not way

He said the corn crop is about 40 percent of normal, and milo is about 60 percent.

Eric Sperber, a manager at Cornerstone Ag, said some dryland corn was a complete loss. Irrigated corn yields have been average - which he described at 190 to 210 bushels an acre – or

Kiel Roehl is the northwest Kansas farm management economist for the Kansas Farm Managebers concerning corn and milo yields.

"Pretty easy to say dryland corn yields are low," Roehl said, "about like last year, probably."

This means yields anywhere from zero to 20 bushels an acre, he said. The dryland milo crop saw the same yields. The test weight for milo showed a lower density because of heat at the end

Irrigated corn was also varied, he said, but in general much lower than farmers hoped for.

Farmer Mike Brown said he has seen yields of between 20 and 40 bushels an acre on his farm in southwest Thomas County. Dryland corn yields have ranged from nothing to 30 bushels, Brown said, and he does not have irrigated corn. He is ment Association. 
