Trauma turns to dream for new Colby coach

One of Colby High's finest state tournament wins haunted Ryan Becker for more than six years.

"As a coach, it was just one of those games that never sit well with me," Becker said after his Columbus High girls team dropped a double-overtime 4A state semifinal to Colby that ended his 2007-08 basketball season. "I couldn't even watch the video of that game until a couple of months ago. But I decided it was time to excise those memories."

Becker also decided if he couldn't erase this nightmare, then why not pursue a dream. His coaching path from Columbus to 6A Wichita South to Colby has taken some unusual turns, including a four-month journey into Alaska that only ended in October.

"I have family up there, so I spent four months doing nothing but manual labor," he explained. "Building cabins, digging for gold, things like that. I didn't I would have liked, but it did help me remember what hard work really is. And my feeling is if you're team. willing to work as hard as you can, eventually you will get what you recalls making long journeys to

Becker always wanted a return rbheadley@nwkansas.com to western Kansas, where he's spent some of his 17-year basketball coaching career. He's also always admired the Colby High girls' basketball success which included that 2007-08 4A state championship.

"In many ways, Colby is a dream job for me," the new Eagle girls' head coach said. "I've watched Colby girls basketball for years and seen numerous successful coaches come from there. They have a tradition of good, quality basketball."

Indeed. Since their state title, the Eagles' ensuing six seasons feature 97 victories and only 28 defeats. They posted a 24-2 record in 2008-09, 20-3 three years ago and 26-11 during these past two campaigns.

All five starters graduated from last year's 13-6 Eagle squad. Yet Colby's girls have still earned a Class 4A Division II No. 7 state ranking from the Kansas Basketball Coaches Association.
