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County sales tax receipts up

Colby Free Press

Thomas County has received more sales tax income this year than had been projected, prompting the Thomas County Commission to approve spending increases for county departments.

At their meeting Monday, the commissioners approved a \$25,000 cash transfer to the county's transportation van, which is \$31,000 over budget so far this year. This was in addition to a Nov. 26 meeting.

The health department increases were primarily due to a large transfer of grant money, said Commissioner Paul Steele.
