Freshman Jared Johnson was the most efficient Trojan with his 1:00 pin at 174.


After Pratt did capture one close 1-0 win for Kasey Crump over Colby's James Jones, the Trojans rebounded to win Saturday's other two matches.

"I was wrong," Bryant told reporters during a Monday morning visit to Cook Children's Medical Center in Fort Worth. "It didn't have anything to do with my teammates. I just ... I couldn't watch Green Bay kneel the ball down on the field after a tough
