
Gun control up to House

WASHINGTON — Propelled by high school shootings, the congressional debate over gun control shifts to a new battleground, the House, following a contentious vote in the Senate that approved locks on all new handguns and imposed tougher restrictions on gun show sales.

But even before the Senate passed the new gun rules Thursday as part of a major juvenile crime bill, there already was a clash in the House — over when to bring the issue to the floor.

House Speaker Dennis Hastert, R-Ill., offered to bring a bill to crack down on violence by kids to the floor in the second week of June, after the Judiciary Committee holds hearings. On the floor, he left open the possibility of proposing gun restrictions, but warned that the House might not buy everything passed by the Senate.

Coach finds job in Wyo.

Wrestling coach leaving Cowboys for another school

Goodland High wrestling coach Eddie Clark is leaving to take a job in Wyoming.

Official action to accept the resignation will be on the agenda at Monday's school board meeting, set for 7 p.m. at the district office. Reached today at his home, Clark said he has accepted a job at Star Valley High School in Afton,

"It is a better position, at better pay, and is a real opportunity for me and my family," Clark said. "It will allow my wife to stay home and raise our son, and that was a real deciding factor."

A successful coach who has taken many Cowboy wrestlers to state since coming to Goodland, including 12 this year, Clark became controversial when a group of parents pushed to have him fired as coach last month. The school board voted 4-2 with one abstention to keep him in the job on April 26 after a tension-filled meeting with both his supporters and detractors attending.

At the meeting Monday, the board will also discuss copy machine bids, and consider a health insurance recommendation for the upcoming school
