MINA, S.D. —Investigators returned today to the site where a jet carrying golf champion Payne Stewart nose-dived into a field, taking samples of victims' remains but cautioning there would be no quick explanation why the plane flew pilotless for 1,400 miles.

Five others also were killed.

A six-member National Transportation Safety Board team walked through the crash site Monday evening, hours after the Learjet crashed, and returned to the task today. They thought they had found the cockpit voice recorder, but they were wrong, board Vice Chairman Robert Francis said.

"It looks the aircraft was pretty much vertical when it hit the ground," he said. "The ground is soft, and it went in fairly deep. It's going to be a challenge, with the wreckage and sorting out what's
