Hunter invasion expected by Friday

The Goodland Daily News Kansas is about to be invaded with thousands of gun-toting guys. No, not the militia or an army, just hunters coming to the best bird hunting in the land.

is expecting from 30,000 to 45,000 non-resident hunters to be in Kansas for opening day of pheasant and quail seasons this weekend.

Mike Miller, publications editor for the Department of Parks and Wildlife, said that the depart- were 330,000 acres in 1997, 480,000 in 1998, and ment has been busy preparing for the season.

"This is the first year we have offered non-resident licenses over the Internet," he said. "It has grown faster than I or anyone thought it would." Miller said since Sept. 1, the department has had over \$80,000 in electronic sales.

Another rush the department has experienced is increasing the walk-in hunter access. There this year, the land has been increased to 630,000.

"The forecast for Saturday is 79 degrees," he said, "that will be tough on the dogs. Not very good bird weather, either."

Another concern the department has is the dry

conditions.

Miller said whenever there are that many people out in dry conditions like there are now, the fire danger is high.

"I would advise that no one drive in the grass at all," he said. "If that grass comes into contact with the catalytic converter, it can ignite."

Miller also advises that all hunters wear orange clothing. It is not required by law for bird hunters, but it does make a hunter safer, Miller said. "The most common accident we see is a hunter

Griffith said since the new procedure was established there have been a couple of fires where the person failed to follow the system and the county attorney has sent the responsible party a letter requesting payment. He said one which happened in the last few months was for \$330. The law which Ken Smith of the state John Sheldon, Kanorado fire chief, fire marshal's office sent include a specific statute which prohibits "the open burning of any wastes, structures, vegetation or any other materials on any premises..." However, the statute also refers to exceptions which are covered in two additional sections. In the section which details the exceptions to prohibition on open burning there are four exceptions including burning on a residential premises with five or less dwelling units ... unless prohibited by any local authority with jurisdiction; open burning is allowed for cooking or ceremonial purposes, on public or private land regularly used for recreational purposes; open burning for crop, range, pasture, wildlife or watershed management as set forth in another statute; and open burning for any other purpose as approved by the Kansas Department of Health and Environment. OSKALOOSA — A murder suspect called the Jefferson County Sheriff's Department before leading authorities to the body of a girl he is accused of killing.

Undersheriff Jeff Herrig declined to say what Thomas Bledsoe told sheriff's officers that led them to consider him a suspect.

Bledsoe, 25, of Oskaloosa, was charged Tuesday with first-degree murder in the death of a 14-yearold girl who disappeared after being let off a school bus at her home last week. Early Monday, he led authorities to the body of Zetta Camilla Arfmann.

Arfmann, of rural Oskaloosa, was last seen Friday afternoon at 4:20 p.m. after she was let off the bus outside her family's mobile home. Her body was discovered about 2:30 a.m. Monday in a ditch three miles northwest of Oskaloosa, covered with dirt and trash.

"I think this is a good idea," he said. "As long as the weather stays this warm there is a very real danger for rangeland fires.'
