

Royals stop winning streak

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — The Chicago White Sox can afford to give the ball to a kid like Jon Garland mid-way through the season.

The Kansas City Royals spoiled Garland's major league debut, stopping Chicago's team-record road winning streak at 12 with a 10-7 victory Tuesday night.

"They have the luxury to throw a 20-

year-old rookie against us to see what he's made of," said Royals outfielder Johnny Damon, who hit a three-run double to tie it 4-all in the second.

"They're 22 (actually 23) games above .500, so they've got plenty of room for error."

Garland, 20, lasted just three innings on a hot, muggy night. He gave up seven runs on eight hits.

"He had good stuff. Obviously, he won't admit it, but he appeared a little nervous out there," Chicago manager Jerry Manuel said. "With a play here and there he could have escaped with a lot less damage."

Royals right fielder Jermaine Dye marked his All-Star selection with a home run, and Mark Quinn and Dave McCarty also homered as the Royals recovered from an early 4-1 deficit to beat the White Sox for the fourth time in five meetings.

Jerry Spradlin (3-2) got the last eight outs for the win.

"I just left some pitches up and that's what happens with a good-hitting team when you leave them up," said Garland (0-1), who was 9-2 with a 2.26 ERA for Triple-A Charlotte and started in place of a struggling Kip Wells. "I think I had pretty good stuff. Even some good pitches got hit. Being here is a dream come true."

Ray Durham and Jose Valentin began the game with home runs for the White Sox, hitting solo shots on Chad Durbin's first three pitches.

"Three pitches, two home runs. I guess that's better than having them hit three-run home runs," Durbin said.

After the second homer, Durbin was thinking of only one thing.

"I remembered the score was 14-10 last night and I thought, 'I know we'll score some runs. Just get back in the dugout as quick as you can,'" he said.



Rockies swept away in double header

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Mark Gardner pitched seven shutout innings and the San Francisco Giants completed a day-night doubleheader sweep of the Colorado Rockies with a 3-0 victory Tuesday.

The Giants won the opener 4-1 as Livan Hernandez held the Rockies hitless until the seventh inning. It was the first day-night doubleheader in San Francisco history.

Gardner (5-4), who threw 57 pitches in a relief appearance on Friday, al-

lowed six hits. He won for the first time since May 31 against Philadelphia, the last time he started.

Robb Nen struck out the side in the ninth for his 15th save in 20 opportunities. He saved both games and has 200 for his career.

The Rockies, who lead the NL with 504 runs, continued to struggle at Pacific Bell Park, where they have scored just once in 36 innings.

Scott Karl (2-3) lost for the first time since April 23 at St. Louis.

J.T. Snow's eighth homer of the season gave the Giants a 2-0 lead in the fourth. Doug Mirabelli added an RBI single in the sixth.

The Rockies had runners on first and second with one out in the fourth and sixth innings, but hit into double plays both times.

In the first game, Hernandez (7-6) didn't allow a hit until Todd Helton singled in the seventh.

Hernandez improved to 5-1 in his last eight starts.
