Flu-like symptoms may be caused by deadly hantavirus

Flu-like symptoms in warmer weather may not be the flu. They may be caused by the hantavirus, a virus carried by mice. Deer, brush and pi-

non mice and western chipmunks carry the virus. It does not affect the rodents, who shed the virus in saliva, urine and

People come into contact with hantavirus by sweeping out a garage or shed that may have sheltered mice, a summer cabin that has been unoccupied for a period of time or during planting and harvesting field crops.

The most common way to become infected is to breath air that has been infected with the hantavirus. The virus causes fluid to build up on the lungs making breathing difficult. Other symptoms that usually appear within the first two weeks include a temperature (101 to 104 degrees Fahrenheit); headache; abdominal, joint or lower back pain; and nausea and vomiting. However, these symptoms may not be apparent for as many as six weeks. Because the virus can be deadly, prompt medical treatment is recom-To reduce your risk of contracting

hantavirus, keep rodents from entering the home and garage. Use steel wool or cement to seal, screen or cover openings and holes. Also discourage rodents from nesting or burrowing in crawl spaces by covering the ground with three inches of gravel.

Trim shrubbery away from building foundations and place metal flashing

around the base of wooden or earther buildings when rodents are a problem. Extend flashings into the soil at least six inches and above ground 12 inches.

Commercial rodenticides can be used as preventatives in nesting areas. These need to be kept out of the reach of children and pets.

To clean and disinfect unused farm buildings, summer cabins or other shelters, always wear protective clothing, rubber or plastic gloves and use a respirator. In mice infested areas the Center for Disease Control recommends using a high-efficiency, particulate air respirator that can be purchased at hardware and farm supply stores. Mop exposed areas with a solution of water, detergent and disinfectant solu-
