

# Cowboys get the first season win

After losing the first game of the season to the state-ranked Hays Indians, the Goodland Cowboys came back strong Friday night with a 33-14 victory at home over the Holcomb Longhorns.

Coach Chris Walters, entering his first season with the team, said the players have been working to smooth out problems in the defensive line.

"We've been practicing hard," said Walters. "We're really getting after it."

It showed in the game, he said, but that wasn't the only reason for the win.

"We weren't playing as hard of a team," the coach said.

Hays High has a larger student pool to choose from and the Class 5A team is state-ranked. The Cowboys are a Class 4A team and Holcomb is a Class 3A team.

As in the game at Hays, the Cowboys scored most of their points in the first half. They went into the second half with a 27-point lead over the Longhorns, who didn't score their 14 points until the third quarter.

The first quarter ended with a score of 0-0, but the Cowboys kicked it into high gear quickly. Luke Stone scored a touchdown early in the second quarter.

Mickey Steiner ran in the second and third touchdowns, with an 85-yard run down the field for the third one. Donald Raymer made the fourth touch-

down, catching a 13-yard pass from quarterback Stone.

In the third quarter, the Longhorns continued to take a beating, with Steiner running in a touchdown to

score 6 points. The team's attempt at a two-point conversion failed, and the third quarter ended with a score of 33-0.

The Longhorns came back in the

fourth quarter, scoring two touchdowns, but it was too late for them to win the game.

The Cowboys gained 372 yards over 57 rushing attempts.

# Knight lectures freshman on manners, loses job

BLOOMINGTON, Ind. (AP) — In the end, Bob Knight, the old-school disciplinarian with a notorious temper, couldn't control the very person he needed most to save his job: himself.

The red-sweatered stalwart of the Hoosiers' bench, the man they once called "The General," was fired Sunday by Indiana University for a "pattern of unacceptable behavior."

That pattern included a chance meeting with a freshman, whose greeting offended the coach and prompted Knight to grab him by the arm and lecture him on manners.

That was enough for IU president Myles Brand, who dismissed Knight, severing his 29-year relationship with a school where he was revered and often reviled — mostly for his temper.

Brand called Knight "defiant and hostile" and said he had shown a "continued unwillingness" to work within the guidelines of the athletic department. He also said Knight violated the "zero-tolerance" conduct policy implemented in May.

"He did not fulfill the promises he gave me," Brand said, adding that Knight had the option of resigning but refused.

Knight had a meeting with his team Sunday night and afterward addressed a throng of students outside Assembly Hall, site of his encounter with freshman Kent Harvey last week.

"In the next couple days, I'm going to get together somewhere with as many students who want to come out, and then I'm going to tell you my side of this thing," the 59-year-old Knight told the crowd. "And I think you'll be interested in hearing it."

Knight may have tried to apologize, according to the Herald-Times of Bloomington.

Mark Shaw, stepfather of the student, said he was contacted Saturday by Knight's friend, Larry Rink, a Bloomington physician, who said the coach wanted to apologize.

Shaw, a Knight critic and former local talk-radio show host, drafted a statement of apology and faxed it to Rink on Sunday morning — one hour after Knight was fired, the newspaper said. The statement called for Knight to take responsibility for the confrontation and to discourage criticism of Harvey and other witnesses.

Harvey could not be reached for comment late Sunday. A message on his dorm room phone said his voice mailbox was full.

Knight, who leaves with a 661-240 record, will be paid for the final two years of his contract. A search for his replacement will begin immediately.

It was Knight's zeal over the years that seemed to draw Hoosier fans close to him, and they reveled in his spirit and unpredictability. In normal conversation, Indiana students and graduates simply called him "Bobby," as if he was the high school coach who lived next door.

But Thursday, Harvey addressed the coach as they crossed paths by saying, "Hey, Knight, what's up?" Knight deemed this disrespectful, grabbed the student's arm and lectured him.

Brand, however, stressed that Knight's run-in with Harvey wasn't the sole reason for the coach's dismissal. He did say, however, that Knight initiated physical contact and, "The two had an uncomfortable exchange."

"The angry contact with the student violates the spirit" of the school's conduct policy initiated in May, Brand said.

There were plenty of tears — inside Knight's meeting with his team as well

as on campus.

"As far as I can remember, back before I came to IU and ever since I graduated, what IU was all about was buying basketball tickets and seeing Bobby Knight," said David Vanrooy, a 23-year-old graduate back in town for the weekend.

"It's really not going to be the same hearing another coach's name announced."

Knight was warned in May about his behavior after an investigation into accusations he choked one of his players during practice in 1997, an act caught on videotape.

But in the 17 weeks since the school put him on notice, Knight badmouthed the administration and alumni, threw a tirade at a female athletic department official in his office and refused to show up at a handful of important school functions, Brand said.

In reaction to the firing, thousands gathered outside Assembly Hall, the arena where Knight won three national championships. The crowd marched through campus to Brand's home, yelling in unison: "Hey, hey, ho, ho. Myles Brand has got to go."

# Bulldogs on a roll, take second win

The Brewster Bulldog football team brought home their second win of the season Friday night, 50-0 over the Jennings/Lenora Coyotes.

Brewster jumped to an early lead with senior Clint Horinek scoring the first of his five touchdowns with a 15-yard run. He caught a three-yard pass from Jay Reid for the conversion to give the Dawgs' an 8-point lead. On the next offensive series, Reid scored on a seven-yard run, and kicked the extra point.

The Bulldog's defense was tough throughout the game, with the team recording 8 quarterback sacks on the night along with two fumble recoveries.

Next, Reid completed a 41-yard strike to receiver Brett Arnberger, setting up Horinek for a one-yard touchdown run adding six more points to the scoreboard. The extra point kick failed. On the next possession, Reid threw an 8-yard pass to Horinek for his third touch down of the night, with the extra point kicked by Reid. Horinek then ran 26 yards for a score, with Reid getting credit for the extra point kick. Reid and Horinek connected one last time in the first quarter with a 43-yard pass play with Reid converting on the kick to give Brewster the 42-0 lead.

In the second quarter, the junior varsity took over with all players receiving lots of varsity experience. Brewster was held scoreless in the quarter, but their defense held strong throughout, not allowing the Coy-

otes a score. At the end of the first half the score stood at 42-0. Brewster started the second half with a defensive score when Nick Jueneman, a senior, dropped a Coyote player in the end zone for a safety giving, Brewster received two more points. Reid then threw a 20 yard pass to Arnberger for a touchdown and the game, for a final score of 50-0.

Leading rushers for Brewster were Horinek, 6 for 79 yards, and Sean Swanson 4 for 44 yards, with the Bulldogs having 176 total rushing yards.

Reid led the team in passing, completing 9 of 11 for 166 yards in the air including four touchdowns. Back up quarterback Jacob Falcon completed one of two for 17 yards, giving Brewster a total of 183 yards in passing.

Arnberger led the team in receiving with 114 yards with six receptions, while Horinek went three for 52 yards on the night. Rob Garner had one reception for a 17 yard gain. Garner averaged 40 yards on kick-offs with 4/160 yards, while he kicked one punt for 29 yards in the contest. Leading the defense were Reid with 11 tackles, John Luckert with seven tackles and one sack, and a fumble recovery, and J.R. Baird with five tackles and one sack during the game.

The Bulldogs will be at home on Friday night when the Sharon Springs Wildcats come to Brewster at 7:30 p.m.

# Mustangs fall to Indians in 24-12 loss Thursday

In the season's second game, the Grant Junior High Mustangs fell to the Hoxie Indians on Thursday with a 24-12 loss.

The eighth grade had a 14-6 loss in its first game against the Colby Eagles and will travel to Atwood on Thursday to take on the Buffaloes.

The Mustangs' Wade Taylor scored both touchdowns last week, one on a fumble recovery and one on a kickoff return, where he ran 62 yards into the end zone. The team missed both tries at extra points.

David Livengood was the game's offensive leader, gaining 46 yards for his team over nine carries. Brock Lohr also had a good game, gaining 40 yards with six carries, followed by Derrick Raymer with a 16 yard gain over four attempts.

Dexter Deeds gained nine yards over two attempts and Lane Winter gained two yards with one carry.
