Coach Chris Walters, entering his first season with the team, said the players have been working to smooth out problems in the defensive line.

Knight lectures freshman on manners, loses job

BLOOMINGTON, Ind. (AP) — In the end, Bob Knight, the old-school disciplinarian with a notorious temper, couldn't control the very person he needed most to save his job: himself. The red-sweatered stalwart of the

Hoosiers' bench, the man they once called "The General," was fired Sunday by Indiana University for a "pattern of unacceptable behavior."

That pattern included a chance meeting with a freshman, whose greeting offended the coach and prompted Knight to grab him by the arm and lecture him on manners.

That was enough for IU president Myles Brand, who dismissed Knight, severing his 29-year relationship with a school where he was revered and often reviled — mostly for his temper.

Brand called Knight "defiant and hostile" and said he had shown a "continued unwillingness" to work within the guidelines of the athletic departimplemented in May


