

Volleyball team 2nd in state

The Goodland Cowgirls volleyball team, now ranked second in the state in Class 4A by the Kansas Coaches Association, swept its varsity and junior varsity matches this week.

"We are doing really well," said Coach Jerry McKee.

He said that the varsity team has beat three state qualifying teams from last year already.

The varsity went up against Lakin, Scott City, and Leoti on Tuesday in Scott City, winning all three of the matches.

The Cowgirls took Lakin with 15-13 and 15-7 wins. Against Scott City they won 15-10 and 15-12 and against Leoti the girls won 15-6 and 15-9.

When the junior varsity played Tuesday, they won all three of the matches, taking Lakin 15-12 and 15-5. Scott City proved a little more challenging, with the girls losing the first game 15-11, and coming back to win the next two games 16-14 and 15-13. Leoti proved to be a difficult match also. Goodland won the first game 15-2, but lost the second 15-7, and won 15-8.

On Saturday, the junior varsity team traveled to a tournament at Machebeuf High in Denver and faced Clear Creek, Holy Family, Machebeuf, Platte, and Colorado Academy.

Against Clear Creek, the Cowgirls won the first game 15-3 and the second 15-12 to take the match. They won the match against Holy Family with a 15-12 win, a 12-15 loss and a 15-8 win. They then beat Machebeuf 15-11 and 15-6.

Their first loss was against Platte, with scores of 5-15 and 9-15, and they faced a second loss against Colorado Academy 6-15 and 11-15.

The "C" Squad faced Sharon Springs on Thursday night winning four out of five of the games. The night got off to a rocky start with a 15-7 loss, but picked up with the next four games 15-3, 15-10, 15-4 and 15-10 wins.

The Goodland girls tennis team has been busy with two meets, one on Saturday at Norton and the other on Tuesday at Goodland.

At the Norton Invitational, which began Saturday morning, Goodland finished third out of five teams with a total of 16 points. Norton was the winner at the meet with 27 points.

Anna Hare, Goodland's No. 1 singles player, had a 1-3 record, defeating Amanda Seemann of Colby. One of her losses was to Brittney Dietz of Osborne, who is a three-time defending Class 3A state champion.

The No. 1 Goodland doubles team of Ashley Engel and Jessica Vignery finished second and brought home the silver medal.

Abby Scheopner and Jennifer Mentzer, Goodland's No. 2 doubles team, had a 2-2 record and finished third.

"It was a good meet with a lot of good competition," said Coach Wallace Hansen.

Four teams competed Tuesday afternoon when Goodland hosted its only invitational of the season at Gulick, Chambers and Steever Park courts.

Goodland and Tribune tied for third with 12 points.

Hoisington finished first with 19 points and Colby was second with 17.

In doubles competition, Engel and Vignery won first place in No. 1 doubles when they beat D. Paulsen

and A. Amos of Colby in a tie-breaker match.

Jennifer Mentzer and Leslie Knitig took third place in No. 2 doubles by beating out Colby's team in a tie-breaker match. The first-place team was E. Higgins and A. Littrell from Hoisington.

Tiffany Thoren of Hoisington took first place in No. 2 singles competition, while Abby Scheopner of Goodland finished second.

"Goodland's team is improving each outing and looking forward to invitationals at Colby, WaKeeneey and Hays," Coach Hansen said.

The Cowgirls will compete against seven other teams from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturday at a varsity meet in Colby.

Rangers sweep away Royals 8-1

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP)— Doug Davis knows there's at least one spot available in next year's Texas Rangers' starting rotation, and the rookie left-hander wants to clinch it now.

Davis took another step in that direction, allowing three hits in 7 1-3 innings, and Rafael Palmeiro hit his 36th homer of the season, leading the Rangers over the Kansas City Royals 8-1 Thursday night.

"In my mind, I think I've already got it," said Davis, who's won three of his

last four decisions. "I've got to finish the year strong, then go in and work hard in spring training. But I've got to be positive. I think I've got it."

Davis (7-5) walked four in the first three innings, five in all, but none turned into runs. He retired 12 straight before a one-out walk in the eighth to Johnny Damon, his final hitter.

Davis, who allowed the fewest hits of his 11 major league starts, said he recovered from early wildness by simply slowing down his pitching me-

chanics.

"I was rushing everything and that left the ball up," Davis said. "Nobody had to tell me. I knew what I was doing wrong and corrected it. I started getting the ball down and getting some ground balls. Every time out I learn more and more."

Texas' defense turned three double plays and didn't commit an error, and Tim Lincecum pitched the final 1 2-3 innings for his second save in eight opportunities.
