County may have cloud seeding vote

Sherman Commissioners will be asked Tuesday to allow a vote to be held on continuing participation by the county in the controversial weather modification program.

Farmer Larry Enfield asked County Clerk Janet Rumpel if a question about weather modification could be put on the upcoming general election ballot.

Rumpel said she put in a call to the Kansas secretary of state's office and was told by Brad Bryant such a vote could not be put on the gen-

eral election ballot.

The issue must be handled as a separate process through the commissioners, Rumpel and Enfield were told. Enfield is expected to ask the commissioners to hold a "straw poll" to determine support for continued participation in the program.

Enfield told Rumpel he wants to see Sherman County get out of the program, which is operated through the Groundwater Management District in Colby.

In recent years Cheyenne and Decatur counties

have opted out of the program through resolutions by the county commissioners.

Flatlander race series is dedicated to a student who died in a car accident

Lisa Hickman was killed in a car accident on her way to school in 1989 and the second part of the Flatlander 5 Race series has been dedicated in her memory ever since, said Richard Schwasinger, a race organizer.

Children meet football players at competition

The Goodland Daily News A colorful collection of Broncos and Chiefs jerseys, displayed on kids from 8 to 15, lined the field at the Cowboys Stadium on Saturday.

Sixty-one participants in the Punt, Pass and Kick competition, sponsored by the Goodland Activities Center, tried out their football skills.

The competition was judged on distance and accuracy. Kids would try to punt, pass or kick a football the greatest distance from a line that was drawn on the field.

For a final score, the distance that the football traveled was measured, and the distance that the ball missed its mark from was subtracted from how far it was thrown.

"The competition went really well," said center director Donna Terry.

In the 8-and-9 year-old girls category, Erica Gonzales received first place with 138 feet and nine inches, Michelle Smith got second place and Kate Robinson got third.

In the 8-and-9 year-old boys category, Jace Mosbarger took first with 151 feet and one inch, Eric Whalen came in second and Nathan Deeds got third.

In the 10-to-11-year-old girls category, Samantha Raymer got first with 112 feet, 5 inches, Amber Webster was second, and Jana McCall got third. In the 10-to-11-year-old boys category, T.J. Hawkins brought home the



first place ribbon with a total of 239 feet, followed by Zack Calkins and then Jason Krayca in third.

There was only one participant in the 12-to-13-year-old girls category, Tanae Garrett, with a 127 foot ,10 inches total.

For the 12-to-13 year-old boys, Derrick Raymer got 276 feet five inches, followed by Jacob Erickson throwing and catching passes. in second and Ryan Gausman in third.

In the 14-to-15-year-old boys, Wade Taylor scored 263 feet, 7 inches to win, Ian Scherling followed and Kanton Keith got third. Ribbons were presented to the kids
