

Team shows improvement

Twenty Goodland cross country athletes ran in the Oakley Invitational on Thursday, and their coach said he was satisfied with the team's improvement. "I came away a lot more satisfied with what we accomplished at Oakley," Coach Don Smith said. "It was just good to have that many participate, because the greater numbers allow us to have competition within the squad which should result in better times at meets."

He explained that the best six or seven runners go on the varsity squad. When there are more team members who want to participate, then they have to run faster to keep the varsity spots. "The end result is that you compete better against other people," he said. In the varsity girls race, Kelsey Cooper ran the two-mile distance in 14:31 to take 18th place, Deanna Livengood ran 14:54 for 26th, Wendy Keith had 16:08 for 33rd place, Anny McCoy ran 16:10 for 42nd, Rebecca Gattshall had 16:33 for 46th place, Haylee Mannis ran 16:38 for 49th, and Tiffany Schwasinger had 17:13 for 55th place. Adrienne Dykstra of Lakin ran it in 12:48 to come in first.

For the varsity girls team score, they had 142 to take seventh place. Northern Valley had 48 for first place.

Smith said it was the first race for Cooper and McCoy.

"As they begin to get more cross country experience, their times are going to drop significantly," he said.

Coach Smith said Livengood had her "best race ever."

Haylee Mannis's time improved from Wamego to Oakley by one and a half minutes, Smith said.

For the varsity boys race, Matt Gattshall ran 3.1 miles in 17:56 for seventh place, Shawn Weber had 19:41 for 30th, Lee McCoy ran it in 20 minutes for 35th place, Speedy Aguilar had 20:06 for 37th, Timothy Kafka ran it in 20:11 for 38th place, Adam McCoy had 20:51 for 49th, and Alan Cebula ran 21:09 for 53rd place. Dennis Zimmerman of Wheatland ran the distance in 17:05 for first.

Goodland's varsity boys team score was 124 for sixth place. Colby had 60 to take first.

"Matt Gattshall had an excellent race," Coach Smith said.

It was his best time of the year, he said. He finished one minute and 20

seconds faster at Oakley than he did at Wamego and got an individual medal by finishing seventh.

For Lee and Adam McCoy, it was their first race.

Coach Smith said Lee maintained the second position of the Goodland squad until near the finish line when Weber passed him.

Smith said Weber was a minute faster at Oakley than at Wamego and Aguilar was about two minutes faster.

Among the junior varsity boys, Lance Tedford had a time of 20:37 for 13th place, Bart McCoy had 21:25 for 20th, Jordan Zwegardt ran the race in 23:17 for 30th place, Michael Mangus had a time of 23:28 for 34th, and Josef Felver had 23:30 for 35th place.

It was the first race of the season for McCoy, Zwegardt, Mangus and Felver.

In the junior varsity girls race, Goodland had one runner.

Chelsee Phillips had a time of 18:06 to take eighth place.

There were 13 teams at the Oakley meet. The temperature was about 85 degrees with winds of 10-15 mph.

The Goodland varsity and junior varsity cross country team will compete this afternoon at Ulysses.

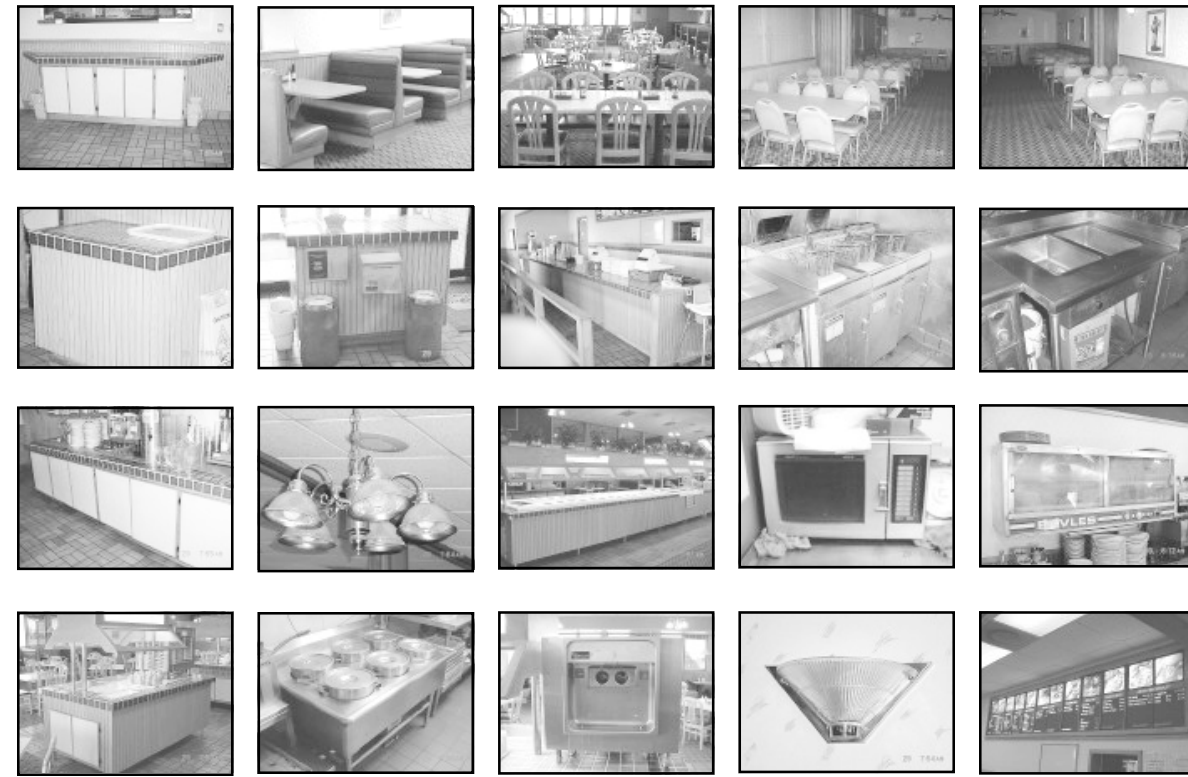
