

Goodland Elks Lodge offers seniors a scholarship for 2001

The Goodland Elks Lodge has scholarship application forms for 2001 available at either their office or the Goodland High School counselor's office for eligible seniors in high school.

The National Elks Foundation will give up to 500 one-year scholarships worth \$1,000 each to children of Elks members through its 2001 Legacy Awards. Any high school senior who has a

parent or legal guardian that has been an Elks member in good standing for at least two years is eligible.

The parent or guardian must have been a member since April 1, 1998. They must also have their member-

ship fees paid up through March 31, 2001.

The application forms must be turned in to the Goodland Elks office.

The office address is Box 146, Goodland, Kan. 67735.

They must be received by Nov. 25, so the applications can be completed by the secretary and sent to the Elks office in Chicago by Dec. 1.

The lodge will once again sponsor a scholarship seminar to be held in

early November.

The seminar will be conducted by Dr. Gary Ash and his wife, Paula, who are chairpersons of the Kansas Elks Association Scholarship committee.

Change to college lets students transfer credits

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since 1978, Keirns said.

"We think it will help Colby as well as help our students," he said of the relationship, adding that a student can transfer in a portion of the required credits and then finish up at Colby.

Keirns said he and the school's board decided last spring to seek college designation, after the state changed the agency that the school answers to.

The state Board of Education used to handle technical schools, but the Legislature decided in 1999 to have the Kansas Board of Regents oversee all of the state's higher education institutions.

"They believed it would be a more 'seamless' educational process," said Keirns.

When the law took effect in July 1999, the technical school was grouped in with the state's six universities, for which the board was already responsible.

"Now that we are under the Board of Regents," said Keirns, "it's just logical that we become a college. Being able to issue degrees puts us on a more level playing field."

Right now, Keirns said, the school is working on an application that will be turned into the Regents in mid-October. Then, he said, the Regents, along with faculty and students from other colleges and universities, will meet at the Goodland campus in November to hear a presentation on the school's request.

"Hopefully they will approve it that day," he said.

Though the state Legislature will have to give final approval and the change wouldn't be official until July, Keirns said the administration will start preparing to become a college as soon as they're sure it will happen. The switch could be expensive.

"We will have to change all of things that have our name on it," said Keirns. "That's going to cost us a small fortune."

Football contest is unique
