In the first game against Quinter, the girls set the mood for the night winning



In a 23-22 victory over Denver Sunday that possibly saved their season, the Chiefs (2-2) netted 49 yards on the ground.

Forty-nine?

In the Chiefs' old days, that would not be a satisfactory number for even a half. League-wide, their average per rush of 2.6 yards is dead last among 31 NFL teams. In total rushing yards, they're 26th.


