At that time, many of the winter annual seeds will have germinated and will be susceptible to the herbicide application. Pick a relatively warm day (55 degrees or warmer) in early November. In either case, the grass should be wet when applying granular products because the herbicide must stick to the foliage for maximum effectiveness.
