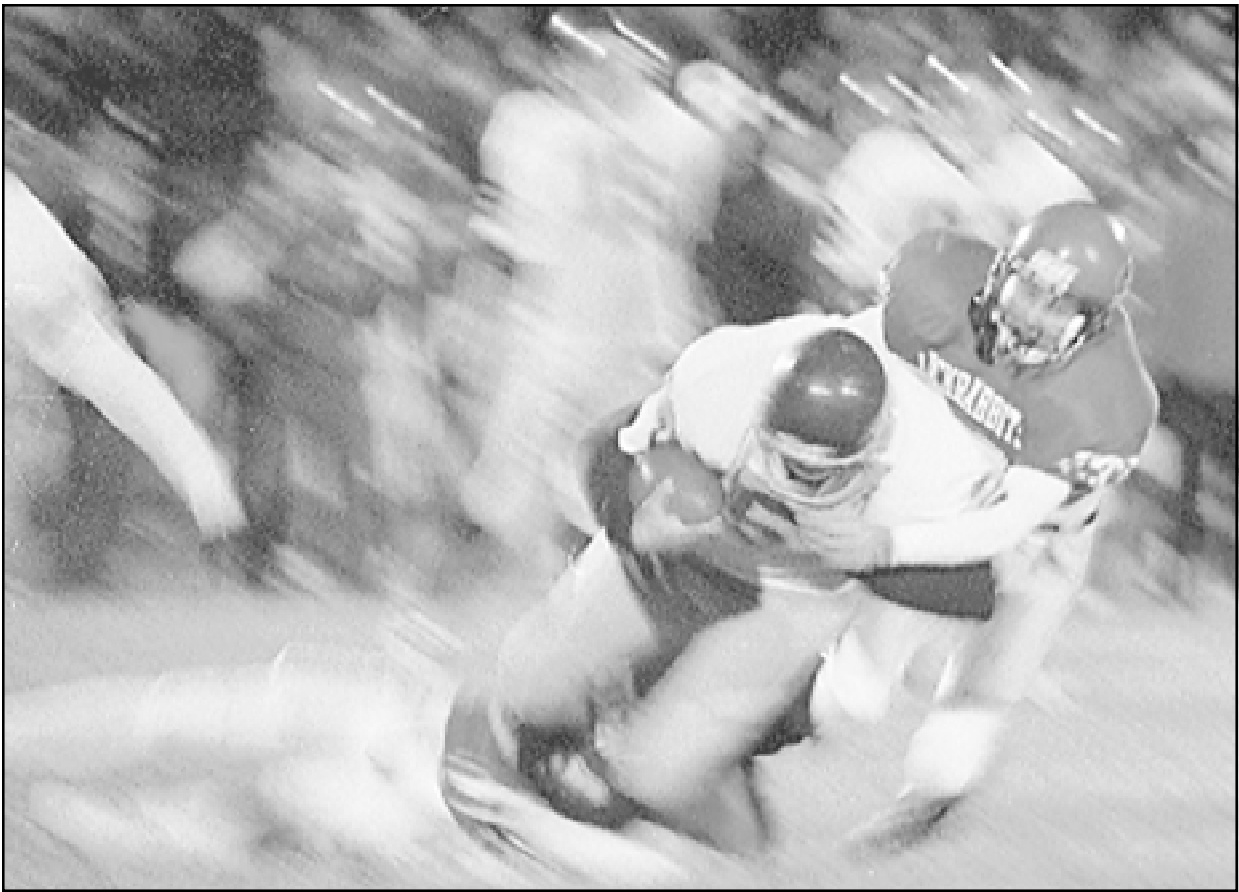


# Brewster can't get past the undefeated Jackrabbits

*Bulldogs cling to lead in the second, but fall*

Top-ranked Brewster had its chances, but the Bulldogs couldn't convert them often enough. And No. 2 Tribune (now 6-0) escaped with a 34-30 win Friday night.  
The Dawgs (5-1) had a touchdown called back, a pass intercepted in the end zone and two broken up in the end zone. The Dawgs clung to a two-point lead at half-time, but the third quarter was fatal.  
The Dawgs' first second-half drive ended with Jackrabbit Trent Peter's interception. Brewster's Jay Reid went back to punt, but passed toward Clint Horinek. The ball ended up in Peter's hands instead. It took just three plays for the Rabbits to score, a 16-yard touchdown from Jay Young.

catch and evaded several defenders for an apparent 32-yard touchdown. However, the play was called back because of an ineligible receiver down field.

Reid kept the ball for a two-yard gain, but Brewster had to punt. The Dawgs caught a break, though, when Tribune's Landon Nix ran into punter

Reid. The automatic first down gave Brewster another chance. Reid was pinned deep in the Brewster backfield, hard by the Tribune bench, when he

lofted an 18-yard strike to Brett Amberger across the field. A couple of plays later, though, Reid's pitch to Horinek went well back of Horinek and Firner recovered it.

The Dawg defense held the Rabbits on their next drive and the Dawgs began their comeback.

Horinek and Travis Dixon gave Brewster consecutive rushing first downs before the drive stalled at fourth-and-one at Tribune's 20. Then a Dawg line surge got Reid the first down. Horinek then gained 15 yards and a facemask call put Brewster at the Tribune 1. Center Justin Jamison led the way for Reid, who scored.

Peter fumbled on Tribune's second play of the fourth quarter and Horinek recovered at the Rabbit 26. Reid went to Arnberger in the end zone, but Tribune's Shea Stewart reached over Arnberger, grabbed and came down with the ball.

Tribune didn't get very far on their next drive. Arnberger's pass break-up and Peter's incompletion, forced by J.R. Baird's pressure, halted the drive.

Brewster then marched to the Tribune 12 late in the fourth. Reid tried a screen pass to Horinek, but Horinek slipped and fell after just a yard gain. The Dawgs lost the ball on downs.

Brewster's defense held, forcing Tribune to punt. The snap to punter Stewart was high, but he came down with the ball. Brewster's Nick Juene-mann saw an opportunity to tackle Stewart for a huge loss, but Stewart got

off the punt. Instead, Juenemann was called for roughing the kicker, then the Dawgs were slapped with an unsports-manlike conduct penalty. That combination got Tribune all the way to the Brewster 30, where Peter knelt to end the game.

Brewster drew first blood in the game, scoring on a 10-yard pass from Reid to Arnberger. Reid tacked on the two-point conversion. Dixon scored on the next Dawg drive, but the conversion failed.

Tribune tied the game with a Peter pass to Young from 10 yards out and Young's 40-yard run. The points were the first Brewster had allowed all season. Peter found Young for the conversion. Firner's run failed on the first point-after attempt.

Reid scored from one yard on the second quarter's second play. P.J. Crumbaker hauled in the conversion pass. Later in the second, Brewster reached the Dawg 11. Two passes to Crumbaker in the end zone were high and Tribune players batted them away. Tribune answered with a 12-yard touchdown pass from Peter to Stewart, but Josh Gooch dropped the conversion pass, giving Brewster a two-point lead at the half.

Horinek rushed for 204 yards and had 70 yards through the air for 274 yards of total offense. The Dawgs got to Grinnell Friday while the Rabbits got to Sharron Springs.

Brewster Coach Larry O'Connor could not be reached for comment.

# Wildcats win over Jayhawks, thanks to a conservative offense

LAWRENCE, Kan. (AP) — In all fairness to Terry Allen, it was the Wednesday before the game when he said his Kansas program is "closing the gap" on Kansas State.

Yeah, right, a cynical Jayhawk booster still might say. A year ago, the Wildcats made it seven in a row over Kansas with a 50-6 rout. On Saturday, the No. 2 Wildcats (6-0, 2-0 Big 12) made it eight in a row but only won 52-13 with about as conservative an offense as any coach can play without taking the air out of the ball.

In the past six years, Kansas State has outscored Kansas 283-63.

It's enough to make a Kansas fan long for basketball.

But if Jawhawk fans are growing weary of being dominated by Bill Snyder's Wildcats, imagine how the Kansas players must feel.

"It makes me sick to my stomach that they can come in here and do whatever they want," said Kansas quarterback Dysten Smith. "We come to school every day and practice every day and then we see K-State license tags."

Pouring salt into the Jayhawks'

wounds was the makeup of the sellout crowd at Memorial Stadium. It seemed as though about half were wearing purple. And no self-respecting Kansas fan would be caught dead wearing purple.

"You think you're going to play in front of your home crowd but then half the fans are for K-State and that's hard," said Kansas State defensive lineman Nate Dwyer.

The Wildcats played as though they were a lot more worried about tipping anything to No. 8 Oklahoma, which comes to Kansas State this Saturday, than they were about losing to Kansas.

They spent most of the day running right up the middle and often had almost all 11 defensive players on the line of scrimmage.

"We have more offense than that," said Snyder. "We have more defense than that. We did what we had to do."

The Wildcats made the second half irrelevant by scoring five touchdowns and a field goal to take a 38-0 halftime lead. Kansas aided them with a fumble, an interception, a muffed kick and a 13-yard punt.

"It's just embarrassing," said Kansas linebacker Dariss Lomax. "This is a waste of time and a waste of talent. We have to get (it) together."

As the Wildcats rise higher and higher in the national esteem, so does their senior quarterback.

Going into this weekend's showdown with unbeaten and No. 8 Oklahoma, Jonathan Beasley has thrown 10 touchdown passes and made 12 touchdown runs as the Wildcats have walloped their six opponents by a combined score of 318-61.

At first, it looked as though the Jayhawks (2-3, 0-2) might make a game of it. They trailed only 7-0 after the first quarter.

But then a 31-point second quarter assured the Wildcats of an unbeaten record going into this week's game against Oklahoma.

"In the first quarter we came out a little sluggish," said Beasley. "But the second quarter, we found our groove. The defense got us some field position and that helped out a lot."

While Kansas State is hosting Oklahoma this week in a battle of

unbeatens, with a BCS bowl invitation possibly on the line, Kansas plays at Missouri.

It may not be fair to ask any team to

play their archrivals back-to-back. But fairness is really not what life seems to be handing Terry Allen these days.

"We need to build on what we've

got, repair some egos and head over to (Missouri) and play a border war," said Allen.

"I don't know if it's fair."

# Kansas State makes leap on AP poll

Nebraska is No. 1 again, but look who's No. 2 — Kansas State.

The Cornhuskers regained the top spot in a big way on Sunday, while one week at No. 1 was too much for Florida State, which tumbled to No. 7 in The Associated Press Top 25 poll following Saturday's 27-24 loss at Miami.

K-State made a power move, too, jumping ahead of Virginia Tech into the No. 2 slot and allowing the Big 12 Conference to become the first league to boast 1-2 teams since 1987.

In the 11th poll of the '87 season, Nebraska and Oklahoma were 1-2.

The Huskers (5-0), who beat Iowa State 49-27, received 67 first-place votes and 1,771 points from the 71 sports writers and broadcasters on the AP panel. Last week, Nebraska had 28 first-place votes to Florida State's 42.

The Wildcats (6-0), who beat Kansas 52-13, had three first-place votes and 1,640 points, while Virginia Tech (5-0) had one first-place vote and 1,627 points. The Hokies beat Temple 35-13.

Nebraska coach Frank Solich is just happy his team is winning.

"There's only about half of the season gone. We've got a lot of football to play," Solich said Sunday. "There's a lot of them dropping by the wayside."

Following No. 4 Miami is No. 5 Clemson (6-0), No. 6 Ohio State (5-0), No. 7 Florida State, No. 8 Oklahoma (5-0), No. 9 Oregon and No. 10 Florida.

Florida, which beat LSU 41-9, gave the Southeastern Conference a Top 10 team again after last week's absence — the first time since 1988 an SEC team was not ranked in the AP's Top 10.

Washington, a 33-30 winner over Oregon State, was No. 11, followed by No. 12 TCU (5-0), No. 13 UCLA, No. 14. Georgia, No. 15 Mississippi State, No. 16 Southern Mississippi, No. 17 Northwestern, No. 18 Michigan, No.

19 Auburn and No. 20 Notre Dame.

Purdue, a 32-31 winner over Michigan, was back in the poll at No. 21, followed by No. 22 Arizona, No. 23 Oregon State, No. 24 South Carolina and No. 25 Texas.

Tennessee (2-3), which lost 21-10 to Georgia, fell out of the AP rankings for the first time since Dec. 4, 1994 — a

streak of 94 consecutive rankings. Joining the Vols on the dropout list were USC and Wisconsin,

Arizona, Purdue and South Carolina are the new Top 25 teams this week.

In the USA Today/ESPN coaches' poll, the top five were Nebraska, Virginia Tech, Kansas State, Clemson and Ohio State.

# Trojans holding basketball clinic in Goodland
