

Don't let pajamas become a burning issue for kids

Are you slipping a billowing T-shirt on your kids when you get them ready for bed? Think again. They'll be safer in sleepwear that hugs



Permitting older children to sleep in loose-fitting T-shirts, sweats, or other oversized garments is dangerous. It also might be tempting to purchase pajamas that will last through several growth stages or because your child prefers looser sleepwear. The additional ease in oversized pj's may also prove hazardous. Loose garments create air spaces that form a chimney and accelerate flames into a full-scale fire

The Consumer Product Safety Commission sets national standards for children's sleepwear.

Sleepwear made from cotton or other natural fibers does not need to be treated with flame-resistant chemicals if it is snug-fitting.

Snug-fitting garments aren't required to be flame resistant because they are made to fit close against a child's body. The snug fit reduces the risk of burn injury. Snug-fitting sleepwear is less likely to come into contact with a flame and does not ignite as easily or burn as rapidly because there is little air under the garment to feed a fire. Make sure sleepwear has cuffs at wrists and ankles. Sleepwear should be snug but not tight and un-

Follow the instructions on the care label attached to the garment. Be aware that certain laundry products will interfere with the effectiveness of the flame-resistant finish.
