Let's Talk...Many parents want to talk with their youngsters about important issues like sexuality, drugs and alcohol, but are unsure how to approach such sensitive topics.

Research shows that when parents discuss these topics with their children and answer their questions and concerns, the young people are more likely to wait longer before their first sexual encounter and they are also more likely to use protection to guard themselves against sexually-transmitted diseases and unwanted pregnancies if they do become sexually active. They also are more capable of using an aggressive "no" to alcohol and other drugs.

When our children were little we had this way of using a simple "no" to things we knew would cause them harm. That was pretty much it, and they would usually find something safe to pass their time and have fun. This person who at one time long ago like a fairy tale, always used phrases like "1 love you mommy and daddy," "yes, mommy and daddy" and gave us hugs and kisses nonstop.

But then down the line somewhere, somehow they reached an age, the teens, where they went or are going through some kind of metamorphosis. They seem to be from out of this world. Everything and anything upsets them. They don't agree with anything and of course they know it all.
