

Goalie considered greatest

DENVER (AP)—Voila! Make that, Roy-la!

Patrick Roy can be considered the NHL's greatest goalie in any language. "I'm just a little boy from Quebec and here I am today in that position," Roy said Saturday night after tying Terry Sawchuk's career victory record. "It's a long way."

Growing up in French-speaking Quebec, Roy (pronounced "Wah") slept with a goalie stick and dreamed of playing in the NHL. He can now count 447 victories since his debut with the Montreal Canadiens on Feb. 23, 1985.

Roy can move ahead of Sawchuk on Tuesday night when the Colorado Avalanche play at Washington. Avs coach Bob Hartley said Roy will start against the Capitals.

"I want to be out there for the next one," Colorado forward Adam Deadmarsh said. "That was pretty special, but in my mind he's one of the best goalies ever and the next one is going to be the one that's going to be exciting."

Statistically, Colorado's 3-1 victory over the expansion Columbus Blue Jackets seemed one-sided. The Av-

lanche held a 33-15 advantage in shots, but Roy was forced to make several key saves when the outcome was still in doubt.

Roy, playing his familiar butterfly style that entices people to aim for a deceptively small 5-hole, stopped a short-handed chance by Tyler Wright late in the second period, then stuffed Robert Kron on a 1-on-1 attempt midway through the third.

When the final horn sounded, Roy calmly raised his arms and enjoyed the moment with his teammates on the ice. He later rejoiced with his parents, wife and three children in the halls of the Pepsi Center.

"I felt really nostalgic," he said. "You certainly love to go back and remember the good and the bad moments and all the people that have been very supportive. ... My dad said, it takes 447 games to reach this player and it takes only one to pass."

Roy's historical march has energized Colorado at a time when it's easy to take early season games for granted. The Avalanche (3-0-2) remained unbeaten as they begin another run at the Stanley Cup.

The motivation to put Roy in the

record book figures to be supplanted by the desire to win the cup for defenseman Ray Bourque, who is seeking his first championship in 22 seasons.

"I just love the way things are going right now for myself and the team," Roy said.

"I think everybody on this club is really enjoying every moment. We're all on a mission this year. We have a guy on this team that really deserves to win the Stanley Cup and we have a second chance."

Like Bourque, who spent more than 21 years in Boston before his trade to Colorado in March, Roy came to the Avalanche after a long tenure with Montreal. He has not disappointed, winning 158 games in less than five seasons in Colorado.

"The time went by so fast," Avalanche general manager Pierre Lacroix said. "He's had such a great career."

The "Roy Watch" is far from over. Having caught Sawchuk, Roy now gets to set the standard for everyone else to chase.

"He's a winner," forward Peter Forsberg said. "I'm sure he's going to get a few more wins. He's not done yet."

Cowboys fall to the Tigers 27-20

Coach says team still has a chance to make it

In their first district game of the season, the Goodland Cowboys fell to the Ulysses Tigers on Friday with a 27-20 loss.

It was the first game of three to count towards state playoffs, and though Goodland lost, Coach Chris Walters said the team still has a chance to make it.

The easiest way is to just win all three games, he said, but if that doesn't happen then the 2-1 team that has accumulated the most points will be the one to advance.

He said teams gain points by winning or losing, and a losing team can lose up to 13 points, while a winning team can gain up to 13 during each game. Because Goodland lost to Ulysses by seven, Walters said, the team is now at -7, while Ulysses is at +7.

Scott City and Colby are the other teams in Goodland's district, and after shutting out Colby on Friday 28-0, Scott City is now +13. Colby is now -13 and in the worst position of the district teams.

Goodland will travel to Colby on Friday to face the Eagles. Walters said the Cowboys must beat the



Eagles by the maximum 13 points to stay in the running.

The Tigers will face Scott City next week, and Goodland's position may depend on which team wins that game.

Walters said if Scott City beats Ulysses, the Cowboys will have to score even more points.

Scott City could face the Cowboys with +26 points, and if Goodland beats Colby by the full 13 points the team will have +6. Then, Coach Walters said, Goodland will have to beat Scott City by more than 7 points to advance to the playoffs.

Before the game, the coach said the Cowboys were looking to win all of their playoff games.

"It's not where we wanted to be," he said. "Now our destiny is out of our hands."

Walters said the Cowboys just didn't play as well as Ulysses and then couldn't score in the fourth quarter.

With the score of 27-20 in the favor of Colby, Goodland was driving for the goal line in the fourth quarter. Two back-to-back penalties held up the Cowboys and they couldn't make it into the end zone. Time ran out with the Tigers holding the ball.

The Cowboys gained 296 yards in 31 carries, while the Tigers gained 273 yards in 50 carries. Mickey Steiner made one touchdown and gained 100 yards in 18 carries. Luke Stone made 2 touchdowns and gained 187 yards in 9 carries, and Tyler Henderson gained 9 yards in 4 carries.

Quarterback Stone had four of 13 pass attempts completed for a total of 62 yards in pass plays.

Matt Mentzer caught two throws, completing 36 yards in pass plays. Bryce Abbey and Henderson each caught one throw, with Abbey completing a 21-yard pass play and Henderson completing a 14-yard pass play.

Oklahoma beats Kansas State 41-31

OK, Oklahoma. While Nebraska maintained a firm grip on No. 1, the Sooners soared to No. 3 in The Associated Press Top 25 poll on Sunday after a convincing 41-31 victory over Kansas State.

Oklahoma (6-0) advanced five places from last week and received four first-place votes in balloting by the 71 sports writers and broadcasters on the AP panel.

It is the highest ranking for the Sooners since 1987, when they were ranked No. 1 in the final regular-season poll before losing to Miami in the Orange Bowl. Oklahoma was last No. 3 in the fourth poll of the '88 season.

The Cornhuskers (6-0) beat Texas Tech 56-3 for their easiest win in more than a month and collected 66 first-place votes and 1,770 points. Virginia Tech (6-0), which beat West Virginia 48-20 last Thursday night, moved up a spot to No. 2 with one first-place vote and 1,656 points. Oklahoma had 1,603 points.

Kansas State (6-1) and Ohio State (5-1) took expected tumbles after losing for the first time this season. Both fell eight spots — the Wildcats from No. 2 to No. 10, the Buckeyes from No.
