Player sets a state record for touchdowns

Goodland Daily News BREWSTER --- With startling efficiency, Brewster destroyed Golden Plains Friday night in the Bulldogs' first district game. Brewster scored on every possession but one, ending the game at halftime 68-6.

The game would have been a completely routine drubbing but for one thing — Jay Reid's new all-class state career touchdown record. Reid tied the mark of 119 career touchdown passes with 13.9 seconds left in the first quarter with a one-yard pass to Brett O'Connor said. "He's always been second touchdown, the record-Arnberger.
