

Bulldogs destroy Golden Plains in first district game

Player sets a state record for touchdowns

BREWSTER — With startling efficiency, Brewster destroyed Golden Plains Friday night in the Bulldogs' first district game. Brewster scored on every possession but one, ending the game at halftime 68-6.

The game would have been a completely routine drubbing but for one thing — Jay Reid's new all-class state career touchdown record. Reid tied the mark of 119 career touchdown passes with 13.9 seconds left in the first quarter with a one-yard pass to Brett Arnberger.

"It took him (Reid) a lot of time to get the record," Brewster coach Larry

O'Connor said. "He's always been pretty consistent."

Officials stopped the game to hand Reid the ball, but when Arnberger's

second touchdown, the record-breaker, came two minutes later, at 10:04 in the second quarter, the game didn't stop.

Reid did get that ball after the game, though.

"It's an honor to have this record," Reid said. "It will be good to brag about

in the family."

He knows he didn't do it alone, though.

"I owe it to my teammates," he said. "If I had not had good teammates, I would not have had this record."

To Reid, the record is secondary to winning.

"The state record isn't nearly as important as continuing to win," he said.

If Brewster continues the efficiency they showed Friday night, the wins should continue to come.

Running back Clint Horinek scored three straight touchdowns on a seven-yard reception, then runs of five and two yards before Arnberger's one-yard catch ended first-quarter scoring.

Reid then picked up the record after Justin Jamison's sack ended Golden Plains, first drive of the second quarter.

Arnberger, who caught the record-tying and -breaking passes, was glad to be part of history.

"I can't take much credit for the record," he said, "especially since

(former Dawgs) Paxton (Crumbaker), Jordan (Reid) and Philip (Widener) caught all those passes before me."

After the record was taken care of, Brewster scored the rest of their touchdowns on the ground. Horinek scored from 12 yards and Reid from 15. Then Horinek got a fumble recovery and took that in from 25 yards out.

Golden Plains' only score came after the fumble recovery on Dain Carmen's 63-yard kick-off return with 4:58 left in the half.

Horinek then finished Brewster scoring with a 33-yard run.

Brewster faces Cheylin in Bird City Thursday night. Kickoff is at 7:30 p.m. Both are 1-0 in district play. Brewster feels confident going into the regular season finale.

"We had a good week of practice last week," O'Connor said, "and we're pretty focused now. I hope we're ready to get at it."

Horinek rushed for 154 yards and five touchdowns. Reid was 8/11 for 101 yards and three touchdowns. Reid led Brewster with 10 tackles.

Coach happy about rivalry

Kevin Steele is a traditionalist. The Baylor coach admits it and he's proud of it. So when he thinks about Nebraska playing Oklahoma on Saturday, he's both happy and sad at the same time.

Happy that the two rivals are meeting again, sad because they don't play each other every year. And he's not the only one.

Several Big 12 coaches on Monday said it was unfortunate the league's schedule rotation prevents Nebraska and Oklahoma from meeting every season. Steele was just more adamant than the rest.

"I liked it the old way when conferences were not quite as big," he said. "I'm all for the Big 12. I'm excited to be in it, but I'm just a traditionalist."

"Sometimes change is really good. I think it has helped in a lot of ways. But the fact that we sometimes miss Oklahoma-Nebraska, which I think is one of the greatest rivalries of all time, I don't know if that's good for college football."

The Nebraska-Oklahoma game in Norman will be their first meeting since 1997. Because they are in different divisions, they play each other for two years, then go two years without meeting.

With Nebraska ranked No. 1 nationally and Oklahoma No. 3, this year's game is stirring memories of their classic battles of the past, when they met

annually as members of the Big Eight. "It's one of those great traditions," Kansas coach Terry Allen said. "That's what college football is all about. We should do everything we can to preserve the great rivalries across the country."

Count Texas coach Mack Brown in on that point, too.

"I think it's a real shame they don't play every year," Brown said. "But as long as we're looking at the growth of conferences across the country, and it seems like the Big 12 is something people were looking for, I know it's changed a lot of traditional games."

Oklahoma coach Bob Stoops said he watched the OU-Nebraska game every year while growing up in Ohio. He enjoyed seeing players like Joe Washington, Greg Pruitt and Johnny Rodgers and liked watching the coaching matchup between Barry Switzer and Tom Osborne.

"For people here it's a special game," Stoops said. "We're excited in the fact it's special again. How they can work it out with the conference to play this game every year, that would probably be pretty difficult, being in different divisions and having a conference championship game."

"You might be able to do it if you did away with the conference championship game. Then there might be the possibility of playing a rival game like this every year. We'll let the conference officials worry about that."

Nebraska coach Frank Solich was involved in many games with Oklahoma as a Cornhuskers' assistant and player. He saw what it meant to fans of the two schools and also to fans across the country.

"I think there are an awful lot of people out there that would love to see it continue," Solich said. "There is such great tradition to the game, such great players have played in it. They've been some of the best games in the history of college football."

"So you don't have to be part of the program to appreciate what it was all about. I think people around the country who follow college football know what the game has been about. I'm sure if you ask those kind of people if they are glad Oklahoma and Nebraska are teaming up, the answer would be a resounding yes."

Chiefs quarterback injured, may be in game this week

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — Elvis Grbac was scheduled for further examination on his injured elbow, but the Kansas City Chiefs felt their quarterback would probably be ready this week.

Less hopeful were the reports on defensive end Eric Hicks, another of about a half-dozen players who were limping and hobbled in the wake of Sunday's 54-34 victory over the previously unbeaten St. Louis Rams.

"Elvis and Eric Hicks are getting MRIs," head coach Gunther Cunningham said late Monday.

"The rest of the guys are banged up.

I think Elvis will be OK. I've seen him get hit like that before and be able to come back. His attitude this morning was tremendous. I just hope the MRI is OK."

Grbac left the game with a painful bruise to his right elbow on the Chiefs' last play of the third quarter.

Also hobbled were defensive lineman Dan Williams, who was on crutches, and wide receiver Sylvester Morris, whose arm was in a sling.

In addition, left tackle John Tait had an ankle injury and linebacker Donnie Edwards was walking with a limp.
