STERLING(AP)-The city commission has proposed implanting license chips in the scruffs of the necks of dogs and cats in its continuing effort to control the problem of strays.

Mayor Quentin Kilgore said the dogs were not as much a problem as stray cats. The issue has been before the commission for months because of complaints by residents as approximately 200 to 300 homeless cats roam free.

The proposed ordinance, prepared by the city attorney and city manager, requires every privately owned cat and dog have the license "chip" implanted in its neck. The chip tracks inoculation and ownership history and can be read by a scanner at the veterinary clinic where the animals are impounded.

Each cat and dog also would be required to wear a collar with an identification tag and be spayed or neutered, unless Specialists for Thursday: Ruggles the animal is kept for breeding purposes.
