Bush carries Kansas easily

TOPEKA (AP) — Republican a polling site in Belle Plaine, south of George W. Bush carried Kansas easily in the presidential race, but his popularity couldn't put the GOP candidate over the top in a hot congressional contest.

The state and its six electoral votes had been considered safe for the GOP since the campaign began, and Bush met those long-held expectations.

With 97 percent of Tuesday's votes counted, Bush captured 57 percent to Democratic nominee Al Gore's 38 per-Ralph Nader, the Green Party candi-

date, received 3 percent and Reform Party nominee Pat Buchanan, about 1 percent. Three other minor party candidates received less than that.

The state's heritage put it in the Republican column. The last Democrat to carry Kansas was Lyndon Johnson in 1964, and with this year's results, the GOP candidate has won the state in 28 of the 35 presidential elections since statehood.

Many Kansans relished the thought of Bush as chief executive after eight years of President Clinton. Exit polls indicated that while their opinions of Clinton were divided more evenly, they overwhelm-

Eldon Nugen cast his vote for Bush at

Wichita in Sumner County. Asked what issue most influenced his vote, he replied, "Just Gore's association with

"I don't want anything to do with Al Gore and Bill Clinton," he said.

But as deep as GOP sentiments run and as well as Bush did in Kansas, it couldn't unseat Democratic incumbent Dennis Moore in the 3rd Congressional District. Moore's Republican challenger, state

Rep. Phill Kline, made Bush's popularity a key part of his campaign strategy. But with nearly all the votes counted, Moore had 50 percent to 47 percent for Kline and 3 percent for Libertarian Chris Republican congressmen Jerry

Moran, of Hays; Jim Ryun, who lives outside Lawrence; and Todd Tiahrt, of Goddard, all won re-election as ex-Results of legislative proved disap-

pointing for Democrats, who had hoped to cut into large Republican majorities in the House and Senate.

Republicans appeared likely to pick up a seat in the House, to make their majority 78-47. The news was worse in Senateraces, where Republicans were poised to pick up three seats, to bring the split to 30-10.


