Johnson, pressured out of the pocket, scrambled left on third-and-12 and jumped to the end-zone pylon. Officials first ruled that Marvcus Patton shoved him out of bounds on the one. But the Bills asked for a review and got the call reversed, making it 21-17 with 2:58 left.



Wide receiver Eric Moulds, who caught eight passes for 67 yards and a touchdown, was put in for defense and batted away Elvis Grbac's pass into the end zone as time expired.

A few minutes after Buffalo went ahead 14-10 early in the fourth quarter, Grbac engineered a 13-play, 63yard drive and put the Chiefs (5-6) on top 17-14 with a 9-yard TD pass to Tony Gonzalez.
