work more to help pay medical bills, but she gets too tired.

When she first went to see Dr. Natalie Griego about the lumps, Snethen said, the blood tests showed that her white cell count was eight times higher than normal. The diseased white cells were eating up the red ones which carry oxygen, she said, and that makes her tired.

Snethen said this type of leukemia usually shows up in people who are 50 to 60. With no treatment, most live seven to 10 years.

Because of Snethen's age, her doctor in Wichita, Dennis Moore Jr., is talking about doing a bone marrow transplant, which he told her works better for younger people.

Snethen has five sisters and a brother and four are possible bone marrow matches. She said if her treatments put her in remission, then the doctors can use her bone marrow for a transplant. The marrow would be frozen.

Snethen has lived in Goodland all her life. She and her husband Keith have a 5-year-old son Todd. They had another son, Marshall, who was killed in a car accident a couple of years ago.

She said God helped her get through the death of her son and will help her get through this. She said the doctors

have been really good to her and Hays has a nice cancer facility.

"They're going to treat me, insurance or no insurance," she said. "The staff is really nice. They really care."

Snethen, who enjoys being around people, has to stay away from crowds now because her immune system is weak, but she appreciates all the donations and help she is getting.

She said the federal Social Security Administration will make a decision by Dec. 21 whether or not she is eligible to receive benefits.

"I have four things — family, friends, faith and fantastic medicinethat are going to help me through this,' she said.

Heavy snow paralizes city

BUFFALO, N.Y. (AP) — Abandoned vehicles clogged streets, workers were stranded at offices and schoolchildren had to spend the night at supermarkets, hospitals and restaurants. Yes, Buffalo is used to getting - and usually equipped for — heavy snowfalls but the ferocious storm that struck Monday paralyzed the city with more than 2 feet of snow.

Mayor Anthony Masiello declared a state of emergency and banned driving after midnight, effectively shutting down the city for business Tuesday.

Some 25 inches of snow fell Monday, the third-highest total for any 24hour period in the history of this winter-hardened city. More than 40 inches have fallen this month.

The National Guard was en route to help the city dig out.

School bus drivers were told to take children to the nearest public building, including supermarkets, City Hall, hospitals, restaurants and government offices. About 2,000 students were expected to be stranded all night, authorities estimated.
